Rookie Police Taking Training At Mich. State

Better police protection for Michigan communities is the objective of the basic police training course currently being held at Michigan State University, officials stated.

Four Michigan law enforcement agencies are presenting this month-long program in cooperation with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Michigan Department of Public Instruction and the M.S.U. School of Police Administration and Public Safety.

A 22-man faculty, comprised of people from the sponsoring organizations, will present 140 hours of instruction on "What the Police Office Needs to Know."

Twenty-four rookie policemen, who began the course on January 7, will be "graduated" at Kellogg Center on February 7.

During the first two weeks of classes, the fledgling officers discussed such topics as police history, driver improvement, probation and patrol, the motor vehicle law, accident investigation and criminal law.

Topics for the second two weeks include gambling and narcotics, fire arms instruction, interviewing and interrogation and the police service.
