Tagged Rainbow Trout Holds Travel Record

A tagged Michigan rainbow trout holds the record for the longest journey to date for any fish covered from Conservation Department, the 23,000 rainbow planted by the ment fish workers in 1955.

Planted in May, 1955 in Pindell's Creek, Chippewa county, the tag and trout was caught in November 1956, in the Brule River, on the Michigan-Wisconsin boundary in Iron county. The rainbow had traveled at least 370 miles by water from the point of release.

During its 18 months of travel, the rainbow grew from an eight-inch, 24-ounce youngster to a 20 1/2-inch three-pounder.
