## PLUMBING CODE FOR FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP

An Ordinance regulating all matters concerning plumbing, pertaining to the installation, alteration, maintenance, inspection, and reinspection of the plumbing systems in all structures and premises in the City of Detroit, except public buildings, service connections, and service pipes up to and including the discharge of the meter, defining the powers and duties of the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering in relation to the inspection of installations, alterations or maintenance of plumbing and drainage.

Donation of Buildings and Safety Engineering to collect fees for permits, surveys, licenses, certificates and/or inspections; to provide for the licensing and registration of plumbers and tradesmen who install, alter, maintain or service plumbing, drainage, or water supply systems in any building, structure or premises in the Township of Farmington; providing a penalty for the violation thereof and for the enforcement of former ordinances which may be in conflict therewith.

It is hereby ordained that the people of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan: That under the power and authority of the laws of the State of Michigan the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, does hereby adopt and enact the reference Ordinance No. 4945 of the City of Detroit, Wayne County, Michigan, which Ordinance is the Official Plumbing Code of the City of Detroit, provided that such adoption and enactment shall be subject to the exceptions, changes, amendments and additions hereinafter set forth:

1. This Ordinance shall be known and may be referred to as the "Official Plumbing Code of the Township of Farmington."
2. Whenever and where ever the words "City of Detroit" are referred to hereinafter, such words shall be understood to have reference to the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan.
3. Whenever and where ever the word "Detroit" is used in the word "Department of Building and Safety Engineering" shall be and are hereby substituted in the place thereof the words "Farmington Township."
4. Whenever and where ever the word "Commissioner" is used in the Detroit Code, it shall have reference to the Commissioner of the Department of Buildings and Building Safety of the Township of Farmington heretofore created.
5. Whenever and where ever the word "Department" is used in the Detroit Code the words "Department of Public Building and Building Safety of Farmington Township" shall be substituted therefore.
6. Whenever and where ever the word "Bureau" is used in the Detroit Code the words "Department of Buildings and Building Safety of Farmington Township" shall be substituted therefore.
7. Whenever and where ever the words "Department of Building and Safety Engineering" are used in the Detroit Code the words "Department of Buildings and Building Safety of Farmington Township" shall be substituted therefore.
8. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon the passage thereof.
9. This Ordinance shall be published in the Farmington Enterprise, a newspaper having general circulation in said Township of Farmington within ten days after the passage thereof.

Copies of the Official Plumbing Code No. 4945 of the City of Detroit are available for inspection by the public at the Office of the Clerk of the Township of Farmington and are available for purchase at the public charge of \$ . . . . . per copy.

This Ordinance was introduced, adopted and amended at a regular meeting of the Township Board of Farmington Township held on January 22, 1957 by a vote of seven yeas and no nays.

## Child Literature Authority To Talk Here This Friday

Doctor Leland Jacobs, famous author teacher and speaker, will speak on the topic "Enriching Children's Literary Experiences" at the Farmington Senior High School at 3300 Shawnee Road this Friday afternoon at 1:30 p.m. Arrangements for the program which is being presented at school, will be made by the county were made by the Oakland County Board of Education in cooperation with various administrative heads of school districts.

In order that all teachers in the elementary and secondary schools in the Farmington School District have an opportunity to hear Dr. Jacobs talk, classes will not be held Friday afternoon. Though primarily for teachers, the talk will be open to the public and many interested parents wishing to hear Dr. Jacobs talk are invited to attend.

A nationally known authority on children's literature and an outstanding speaker, Dr. Jacobs holds degrees from Michigan State Normal, B.A.; University of Michigan, M.A.; and the University of Chicago, Ph.D. His teaching career includes grades eight and tenth and twelfth graders in high school. He has been a member of the National Language Arts and Children's Literature at both the undergraduate and graduate levels in college.

Dr. Jacobs has lectured extensively at universities throughout the Midwest on language arts, children's reading and literature for children. He has also lectured on many school systems on similar topics.

Among the professional articles which he has written are: "Elementary English," "Childhood Education," and "The Nation's School." He is also co-author of "Student Teaching in the Elementary School," "Children's Teaching and Language Arts," and "The Treasury of Literature," a series of literature for children in grades three through 6.

## To Take Part In Exercise Big Blast VI

Lt. Colonel George W. VanDauson, of 28553 Quail Hollow, Farmington, a member of Michigan's 70th Infantry Division (Reserve), is off to fight a mock battle at Fort Sheridan, Illinois, Exercise Big Blast VI, scheduled February 2 and 3. The mock battle will provide a "warrior course" for provisional corps, division, and other unit commanders and their staffs assembled from the eastern sector of the 13-State First Army Area.

Forty general officers plan to participate in this, the biggest of the Big Blast exercises to date. The purpose of the exercise, its planners said today, is to provide training for commanders and staffs in tactical, intelligence and logistical operations under assault conditions, and to test their chemical, bacteriological, atomic, chemical and electronic warfare capabilities. Both the "friendly" and "enemy" forces are assumed to have these capabilities.

Play of Exercise Big Blast VI will serve to bring participants up to date on the latest developments in organization, concepts, procedures and techniques, headquarters staff planning officers explained.

The combat situation assumed for Big Blast VI is one that developed from the previous Big Blast series, and will involve continuation of an army's large-scale offensive operations as they develop during a 24-hour period.

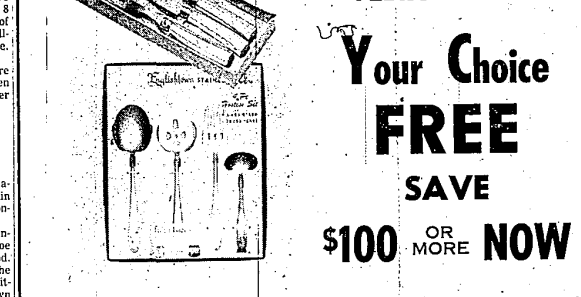
