Request for "Safety: Selected References" will be welcomed by the Library Extension Service, Room 1, General Library, Ann Arbor.

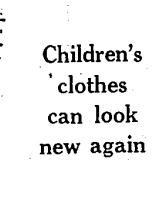
Goodwill Industries Pick-Up Stated Feb. 4

Opposed To Building Gyms Instead Of Classrooms

Being rather tax-conscious at the moment, having just paid the current statement (the greatest portion allocated to school expenses) it was quite a pleasant surprise to read in the January 17 issue of The Farmington Enterprise that the proposed Kendallwood School plans are to be revised to cut building costs.

We read and hear constantly of the extreme need in our country for more classrooms and more adequate salaries for our teachers. So that this most important and sad-depleted profession will once more become attractive to the high-caliber personnel it requires. Most of us I believe share the attitude that the best possible education available to our children is vital, and cooperate cheerfully in voting for the necessary funds.

However, the current national trend is rather alarming; it would seem that the "Three R's" are to be relegated to the sidelines in our modern public education system; the extra-curricular activities are in the spotlight, especially athletics. At times the comparison between the salary of a classroom teacher and that of an athletic coach could be ridiculous, if it wasn't such a serious matter.

For instance, in view of the acute need locally for more classrooms, it is also necessary that the Farmington property owners underwrite the cost of THREE gymnasiums for a community of this size. I had always admired the (current) Junior High gym and thought it quite adequate; I have attended numerous functions there and only twice was it filled to capacity when I was present. I was aghast when I was told the new addition to the High School was another gym, and still more so when I saw the plans for the third one (at the new Junior High now in construction).

If the chief aim of our public schools is to be little more than a proving ground for big-league baseball, basketball or football seducto to look over, why not have these leagues subsidize our athletic costs, since it is for their ultimate benefits.

I am not against sports; in fact, I enjoy them, and if my tax money must be allocated for them, I would much rather have seen a swimming pool installed rather than either of the last two gyms. However, I do believe that when our forefathers guaranteed every American child the right to an education, they never anticipated how their conception of basic knowledge would be distorted. School should primarily be a place where you learn to read, write, figure and use your intellect; for this, I will happily continue to pay taxes. Let us be honest and label the rest a Recreation tax, and make it optional for those who want to pay it. I am sure if the funds derived from the school tax were used as originally intended—for EDUCATION—, our current

problems in public education, both locally and nationally, would be promptly alleviated.
