The Guys and Dolls Teen Club dances are held at the V.F.W. Hall on 7 Mile Road just off Grand River.

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
**Gives Tips On Washing Most Leather Gloves**

Most leather gloves are hand-washable, but don't take it for granted. Read the label to see if it states that your gloves are washable in cold water. If not, try using rich, lukewarm suds, washing the gloves on your hands. There is an exception to this rule, however. Chamis and doeskin gloves should be washed off the hands.

The second step, according to Mary A. Hixon, Oakland County Home Demonstration Agent, is to remove the gloves from your hands by rolling gently from the wrist, then rinse them in cool water. To knock out excess moisture roll them in a turkish towel, starting with the finger tips and rolling toward the wrist section. Next, unroll the gloves immediately, blow into them to puff them into shape and dry indoors away from excessive heat.

When the gloves are dry they may appear stiff. Just massage the leather gently with your fingers and the softness of the leather will return.
