The veteran still is a potent force on the Michigan college campus, according to the Veterans Administration.

Approximately one out of every five males in Michigan colleges and universities is a veteran, enrolled under the Korean GI Bill, Lloyd H. Jameson, VA's regional manager for Michigan, said. Future large numbers of veterans are expected to be attending schools of higher learning for at least the next five or six years.

Complete year-end Korean GI Bill fall enrollment figures for Michigan, released by VA, disclosed a total of 20,048 veterans in college under VA benefits.

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Judge Kaufman Urges Unified Family Living

"It's about time we started living good," Judge Kaufman stressed in a workshop sponsored by the Clarenceville PTA Council last week.

In a plea to parents to help their children live decently, Judge Kaufman said, "We can do this by setting good example, eating together and praying together as a family, by using good common sense—Let's worry about ourselves here, not people in Egypt, Europe, or Japan—Let's live how our parents and grandparents lived; we've got to make the child feel a part of the home."

The Judge pictured the juvenile delinquent of this century as one who was affected by terrific tension as a result of the Second World War, Korean War, worry over Egypt, and continual talk of war and confused state of affairs.

He placed the entire responsibility of the child on the parents and the home. Divorce, separation, immorality have only added to the progress of delinquency, he pointed out. The parents must run their own home; they do not need specialists, psychologists, social workers, psychiatrists.

"The home must be a home that a child enjoys; the child has to be a part of the home," was Judge Kaufman's solution to one of today's biggest problems.

In conclusion to the workshop, Mrs. Irvin, chairman of the State Juvenile Protection Committee, stated that the PTA's role in this situation would be to provide youth activities, opportunities for health, recreational facilities in the home, work possibilities and experiences for children, a clean-up literature, forming a stricter film code, holding parent education classes, and forming of parent-youth codes.

Art for children, teen-agers and adults will be combined into a single exhibition called "Form in the Animated Cartoon," scheduled to open at Cranbrook Academy of Art Galleries on February 9. The show will continue every week-end until February 24.

Sponsored by the American Federation of Arts, the exhibition consists of artwork and films by UPA Pictures, Inc., creators of the famous and beloved "Mister Magoo" and "Gerald McBoing-Boing."

All the major steps in cartoon making are included: identical sketches in several color combinations; the relation of dialogue and sound effects; and an aluminum drum which visitors may spin animates single drawings.

Among the cartoon films to be shown in connection with the exhibition are Ludwig Bemelmans' "Madeline," "the whimsical little French moppet," James Thurber's "Uncle in the Garden," "Maggie Goes Skating," the near-sighted Mister Magoo, that is, "Gerald McBoing-Boing's Symphony."

Public showings of these color films will be held in the Galleries on Saturday and Sunday afternoons at 3 o'clock, February 9 and 10, 11 and 17, 23 and 24. School groups may make special appointments for cartoon showings on week-days by calling Midwest 4-1000, Extension 80.
