Full Slate Of Democratic Candidates Seek Election To Township Board

This is the second in a series of articles on the various candidates seeking election to offices in the Township this year. The third and final article in this series will follow next week.



JOSEPH J. DEMARCO
Board Trustee

Presently a member of the Township Board of Review, having been elected in 1955, Joseph J. DeMarco this year will seek election to a seat on the Township Board.

DeMarco, 45, has lived at 21417 Collingham Street for the past nine years moving here from Highland Park where he had made his home for 14 years. He is married and the father of two children.

Employed as a machinist, DeMarco has been with the American Metal Products Company for the past five years. He was previously self-employed. He has been a member of the Detroit Federation of Musicians, Local 5, for 18 years and also a member of the Metropolitan Club of Michigan, Farmington Township Spirit 81. He has served as president of the latter organization for three years.

"Government by favor is not the American way of government. We need men who we know have no fear of change and do not let tradition hold back the community from progress," DeMarco said. "Problems are not presently met with understanding. Registered voters must help to correct this problem by voting for men who have proven their interest in your community and are best qualified for the service they must render in conducting their office," DeMarco concluded.



E. LOUIS DORRIS
Board Trustee

A resident of the Township for seven years, E. Louis Dorris makes his home with his wife and three children at 20901 Orchard Lake Road.

Dorris, 42, has been employed for the past 16 years with the Moore & Company as a tool room surface grinder. Prior to moving here, he lived in Detroit.

"As Township Trustee, if elected, I will fill the office entrusted to me to the best of my ability for the growth and progress of our community," Dorris said.

"I shall be my duty to meet my fellow citizens and discuss the manner in which the major Township problems can be solved and it shall be my duty to bring these problems before the board. We have many dry-well areas as well as some major problems confronting our progress," Dorris stated.

Dorris is a member of Farmington Lodge No. 351, F. & A.M. and of Claremont Lodge No. 427. He holds the office of Past Noble Grand in the latter organization.

MRS. CHRISTINE FELLOWS
Board Trustee

A housewife, Mrs. Christine Fellows lives at 21116 Robinson and has been a resident of the Township for 11 years.

Born and raised in Detroit, Mrs. Fellows, 39, has two children. Her home which she owns in Clareville and Thomas who is in the Navy.

Mrs. Fellows has served as secretary of the Farmington Democratic Club for the past three years. She is a member and past vice-president of the Clareville Girl Scout Association and is presently a Girl Scout Troop leader. She also belongs to the Clareville Evening Mothers' Club and to the Parent-Teachers Association.

Mrs. Fellows commented. "The question of water for dry areas, fields to be made passable and recreation areas for our young are to me of major importance. I should like to see anyone thinking I have an answer to all these problems. However, if these situations can be corrected, I wish to be in a position to contribute constructively about it," Mrs. Fellows stated.



RICHARD HUG
Board Trustee

Richard Hug who makes his home at 21789 Springbrook Drive has lived in Farmington Township for the past 7 years. Hug is a native of Detroit and resided there all his life prior to moving here.

Hug, 40, is married and the father of four children. He has been employed as an accountant with the Timken Detroit Axle Company for 16 years and is a member of the International Accountants Society.

"The present methods of our township government should be replaced with a modern and progressive system through changes in methods and procedures," Hug commented. "By so doing we would insure the taxpayer full value for each dollar spent."

"Water, sewers, roads and rubbish pickups are major problems which must be solved with an eye towards the future as well as the present in order to meet the demands of a rapidly increasing population," Hug concluded.



JEAN R. LEE
Trustee

Vieng for the office of Township Treasurer against Clayton Goers, incumbent, in the General Election will be Jean R. Lee of 23579 Whitaker.

A resident of the Township for three years and the City of Farmington for 2 1/2 years prior to 1954, Lee, 31, has been employed for the past ten years as a trim designer with the Fisher Body Division of General Motors Corporation. He is married and has a son 8 years old. Mrs. Lee is a native of Pontiac having lived there 25 years prior to moving to Farmington.

Active in the Democratic Party, Mrs. Lee is a member of the Oakland County Democratic committee, a vice-chairman of that group in 1955-56 and was a delegate to the 1956 Democratic National Convention in 1956. In 1953-54 she was a member of the Democratic State Central Committee. Also active in committee groups she is member of the Farmington Town Club and the Gill Road PTA and on the executive committee of the Oakland County Townships United Fund.

"I think the major problems in Farmington Township including water shortage, sewage disposal, planning and road improvements, present only a few, are well known," Mrs. Lee said.

"As treasurer and a member of the Township Board, I will be confronted with these problems. My opponents and the other members of the Board have shown little inclination to come to grips with these problems. I believe through cooperation, explanation of all avenues of approach and then decisive action, they can be solved," Mrs. Lee commented.

CATHERINE E. JOHNSON
Township Clerk

Announcement was made this week by Catherine E. Johnson that she will be a candidate for the office of Township Clerk. She will run as a "sticker candidate" in the Democratic ticket in the Primary Election on February 18. Mrs. Johnson is the only announced candidate for clerk on the Democratic ticket and will oppose Floyd Gains, incumbent, on the Republican ticket.

Announcement was not made in time to permit the filing of biographical data on this candidate.



FRANK J. STEPHENSON
Supervisor

Running for the office of Township Supervisor against Albert Cain, incumbent, in the General Election will be Frank J. Stephenson of 24011 Hayes Street. Stephenson, 50, has resided in the township for the past six years and is the youngest of the BaySide Club Lake Road. He is married and the father of two children. Stephenson is a native of Nova Scotia, Canada, having resided there for 44 years. A contractor most of his life, he owned and operated a construction company bearing the same name as his local firm in Nova Scotia for five years prior to moving here.

Stephenson's previous governmental experience dates back to 1938 when he was elected and served for two years as the mayor of Town of Dominion, Nova Scotia. He holds the distinction of being the youngest mayor elected in Canada. From 1946 to February of 1948 he held the same governmental position in the Town of Dominion. During the same period, from 1938 through 1939 and from 1946 to 1948, Stephenson was chairman of the School Commission in the Town of Dominion and of the Joint Expenditure Board dealing with hospitals, jails, etc. in the County of Cape Breton.

In September 1939, Stephenson enlisted in the First Battalion of the Cape Breton Highlanders and went overseas in December of the same year. In 1941 he was commissioned and was discharged from service in 1945 with the rank of major in the Canadian Engineers. In 1947 he served as Provincial State Commander of the Canadian Legion, R.E.S.L. "My experience in the field of municipal administration has taught me that there are many important things a growing community must have," Stephenson said. "An efficient municipal plan which includes a good basic tax structure, industrial zoning, equitable tax assessment and a modern and up-to-date accounting system with capable personnel are musts," he said.

"A Township Board comprised of citizens who are dedicated to public service and will support any and all legislation for the betterment of the whole community is necessary," he said.

Among other things Stephenson cited as being necessary are: a well organized health and sanitation department, qualified inspectors for all departments covered by State and Township codes, good public relations with County, State and school officials as well as all citizens and a top credit rating on the bond market in order to sell bonds.
