Setting a new school scoring record of 36 points, Don MacDonald led the varsity eagles to a 73-57 victory over the Lincoln High Aves. He also set a single man scoring record in the Van Dyke gym.

Four baskets and eight free throws gave Farmington a total of 16 points for the first quarter as opposed to the 14 points that the Aves were able to accumulate.

The score at the half was 31-22. MacDonald was well on his way to the new record with a half-way total of 18 tallies.

The third quarter saw each man sink at least one basket with four for Bud Jones and two for MacDonald. The score at the end of the quarter was 49-36.

It appeared that MacDonald could not miss in the fourth quarter when he sank six baskets and two free throws to establish the new record as well as to insure high point honors for the game.

Coach Burtch's comment was, "Very good team effort on his part. He passed up many shots to fold to others."

The results of the Southfield wrestling match, played Wednesday, February 6, at 8:15 p.m. were received too late to be printed in this week's paper.


The Falcon wrestlers dropped their second match on Tuesday, January 22 to Williams, 39-3.

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
