Inter Warner Street and Powers Road. The Council agreed that the suggestions should be carried out. A request from the Carmelite Sisters of the Divine Heart of Jesus, for use of the Farmington Interceptor Sewer was denied on the grounds that the proposed connection would require too large a proportion of the existing capacity of the system. The Carmelite Sisters are planning the construction of a home for the aged at 2500 Powers Road in Southfield Township. The proposed connection would require approximately one-seventeenth of the total existing capacity of the sewer.

The Council, in response to a letter from the Groves Walker Post, American Legion, approved a motion to sponsor a candidate to the Wolverine Boys State, and appointed Councilman Chapman to represent the City in the selection of the boy.


