

**Scout Cookie Sale To Open Feb. 12**

Girl Scout units of the Farmington area will begin their annual sale of Girl Scout cookies on Monday, February 11. Mrs. Clifford Terry, chairman of the Farmington-Nowi District for the cookie sale, disclosed this week.

The camping program of the Southern Oakland County Council would not function without the profits from the cookie and calendar sales conducted each year by the Girl Scouts. Mrs. Terry said, "The United Foundation Torch Drive does not support our camps."

The established Girl Scout camp is at Otterville and includes 137 acres of rolling hills and woods along Narrin Lake. Here, Scouts may camp for two week periods during the summer and with their troops for weekends the rest of the year. It was pointed out, Indianwood Day Camp, a 45-acre wooded site near Pontiac provides camping experience some Browns and Scouts would otherwise miss. Enrollees are transported to and from day camp by chartered Greyhound buses for eight day sessions throughout the summer.

In addition, there are many council-sponsored trip camps to points of interest for which equipment is provided by camp committees.

Camping is an integral part of the Girl Scouting program and with a booming school population the Southern Oakland Council is faced with the big job of continually enlarging sites and expanding program. Officials of the council stated, "By wholehearted support of the Cookie Sale funds will be available to make future plans."

Girl Scouts will be calling door-to-door during the sale. The ever popular sandwich and the chocolate-covered mint cookie will be sold.
