Federation Teen Clubs Operated By Members Under Adult Advisors

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second in a series of articles designed to acquaint Farmington area residents with the Detroit Federation of Teen Clubs and the operations of clubs within the Federation. The clubs are being written by Bruce McCalber of 3212 Glenview Drive, Farmington, who is a writer for "Teen Life" magazine, a publication put out by the Detroit Federation of Teen Clubs. Efforts are now being made by the Farmington American Legion post in conjunction with other local organizations and interested residents to form a club here. A public meeting is planned for Thursday, February 28, at which time heads of the Federation will discuss the setting up and operation of a local club in detail. The meeting will be held at the American Legion Hall on Grand River. All interested adults and teens are invited to attend.

Each and every club in the Detroit Federation of Teen Clubs chain works like an independent corporation, with the teens as the club members and the adults as the stockholders.

The teens who run the club handle all of the money, their learning to balance their own budget. Each club is run as a non-profit group involving no money from the Federation or any outside source for support.

The only help clubs are allowed to receive is aid from adults. The aid is only to act as advisors, chapters, and sponsors.

Nearly all of the larger clubs have a favorite charity picked by the members of the club to donate their profits to. Such charities are the March of Dimes, United Cerebral Palsy, or Cerebral Palsy.

The smaller clubs have to balance a budget for a smaller income, but most of them stay in operation. All of the teen clubs are governed by just three rules which were the basis of the Federation. The first of these is that no member is allowed to re-enter a dance or meeting after leaving on the same

night.

The second rule was made to give the appearance to be a club. It prohibits any teenager from entering with blue jeans or Levi's.

The third is probably the most important of the three. This rule outlaws misconduct, horse-play, drinking, petting and necking at any dances or meetings. Smoking is also considered a local responsibility.

The club boasts a large variety of talent, since the bands that play at the teen club dances each week are chosen by the Federation. The Federation picks a different band each week to appear at the club dances, giving no money to the bands.

The reason for this is so that one band will not dominate one teen club nor will a larger teen club outbid a smaller for the top talent.

The three main things a club needs to successfully survive are: a good committee to run and keep the club in good order; a lot of community pride and interest; and a strong adult sponsorship which is probably the most important.
