New MESCO Office
For Area Opened

Farmington area residents lie in the service area of the new Plymouth office of the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

The new office is located at 587 South Mill Road, Plymouth, one half mile southeast of the old site. It opened on February 15.

Other communities in the service area are: Plymouth, Livonia, Redford Township, Northville, Novi, Wixom, New Hudson, South Lyon and Walled Lake.

The building, constructed of concrete block, has a large functional room for central operations, payment of claims, and employment services. Smaller rooms are used for counseling, testing, conference rooms, employees lounges and public rest rooms.

The Plymouth office serves the area between 14 Mile Road, Ford Road, Telegraph and Pontiac Road, with the exception of a corner southwest of Joy and Canton Center Roads, which is served out of Wayne.

The Commission has served the Plymouth area since 1945 with a full functioning office; for seven years before that a part time office supervised the area.

Gordon Packard, a Commission employee since 1938, and Plymouth manager for the last four years, will supervise the new building.
