Bible Comment: Holding Life Sacred Is First Thing to Do

In the familiar story of Cain and Abel in the Genesis record, we have not only a teaching concerning man and the sacredness of life, but an emphasis upon the tragedy of loss and the impossibility of restoring what is lost.

We do not realize the worth of things until we have lost them. Cain did not feel the full horror of what he had done until he realized that he had killed a brother—a man like himself—made in God's image.

The marvel is that, with such clear teaching, enforced by examples going so far back in the history of the race, the business of murder and killing should continue in this twentieth century.

How can we stop this terrible thing and turn the hearts of men from violence to peace and love? Is there any hope of doing this until we can bring to men above all things—a new sense of the sacredness of their own lives? We need all the techniques that modern methods and government can supply. But the United Nations, conferences or high level meetings will never end war until we succeed in developing more fully in human life such a consciousness of the sacredness of men that men will feel the full horror of killing.

There are ways of killing and injuring people that have nothing to do with military operations. There are evil trades, evil habits, evil things carried on for greed and profit, that injure the bodies of men. And these things injure and destroy the soul.

God made man for health and strength, cleanness of body and cleanness of mind and heart.

These are the things that He gave to those who will obey His laws and commandments. Let us then say in closing: "Having therefore these promises, beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all defilement of flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God."

Named at a recent meeting of the Board of Directors, Cammareri will spearhead the annual appeal as campaign chairman, leading efforts to maintain and promote greater services for the crippled.

"Our goals have been set," Cammareri said. "Oakland County needs \$50,000 to really help its citizens who are crippled. These are the Society's goals. They cannot be reached by one man nor by one committee, but with the help of hands of all persons interested in the well-being of crippled children and adults. I fervently hope that these goals will be attained."

Residents of Oakland County have made possible the purchase of wheel chairs, braces, crutches, doctor's examinations, X-rays, and care for the physically handicapped child, a free cerebral palsy diagnostic clinic, a two week camp program and many other services provided by the Society through generous contributions to previous Easter Seal appeals," continued Cammareri.
