Detroit Institute Of Arts
Begin Project To Provide 'Big City' Facilities To Outlying Communities

A pioneering project designed to knit more closely together Detroit and its neighboring communities and to offer big-city facilities in its field to the smaller towns, was announced recently by the Detroit Institute of Arts.

The Art Institute's Founders Society is paying initial costs from private funds contributed for the purpose. Contributors are the National Bank of Detroit, Michigan Consolidated Gas Company and the J. L. Hudson Co. whose help was enlisted by Alvan Macaulay, Jr., Founders Society president. In the course of a few years it is expected the program may become self-sustaining.

County lines will be no barrier to the growth of the project which is called the Extension Services of the Detroit Institute of Arts. There is a potential of some 40 communities which may avail themselves of the services, most of which will be advisory.

The program will be in Oakland county, serving Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills where the Detroit Institute of Arts will work in conjunction with the Bloomfield Art Association and the Birmingham Art Association.

Edgar P. Richardson, Institute Director, said the project is the first of its kind in the United States although the Toronto Art Gallery serves neighboring communities on a modest scale in Ontario.

William A. McGonagle, formerly of the Art Institute's Education Department, is coordinator of the new project.

He said today: "We will provide advice on study courses, art workshops for adults and children, films, puppet and other children's theater programs, and lectures, he said."

"Programs formerly presented only at the Art Institute will be extended to communities wishing to cooperate. We will also be a resource center to advise on instructors, materials and equipment. There will be fees for some of the community programs similar to the minimum charges made for programs in Detroit. The communities themselves will set up
