First Dental Visit Big One To Child, Says Hygienist

"Going to the dentist" can be an experience a child will look forward to, if the first introduction is handled properly," says Dorothy Hard, director of curriculum in dental hygiene at the U-M School of Dentistry.

It's a good idea to take your child to a dentist close to his third birthday, says Dr. Hard. Chances are remote that any work will be necessary, so the visit creates a good opportunity for your child to become acquainted with the dentist perhaps by having his teeth cleaned on the first visit. This is a pleasant experience and familiarizes the child with the dreaded drill noise.

If any pain is involved, Dr. Hard suggests two visits, the first for examination and getting acquainted only.

Dr. Hard recommends that dentists show children the steel instruments used in dental work on the first visit and explain that they can be used without hurting.

Fear of a dental appointment is very seldom an idea the child creates himself, Dr. Hard notes. "The problem would not be great if adults would refrain from recalling unpleasant experiences at the dentist's in front of children. Both parents and adults tend to exaggerate their dental chair experiences. When a child is around, this may frighten him when there is no need for him to be afraid."

Dr. Hard suggests two visits, the first for examination and getting acquainted only.
