Commercial to R-1H1 to Industrial: Piece of property comprised of approximately 30 acres, 3. North of this line, and adjacent to Drake Road, extending to Ten and One-Half Mile Road, which will comprise an area of approximately 12 acres. R-1H1 to R-1H2.

The proceeds of the levy therefor to be used for the support of the District Library (Township of Farmington and City of Farmington). MOTION by Tardy, Supported by Harris, that we adopt this proposal as presented, and that it be put on the Ballot, April 1, 1957. Carried.

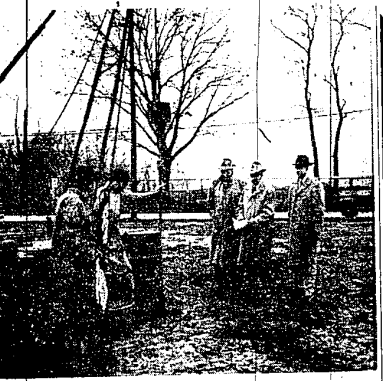

### Nearly 6,000 Game Law Violators Arrested

Conservation officers made a total of 5959 arrests during 1956 and more than 96 per cent of these cases resulted in convictions. Convictions were recorded in 5735 cases; another 166 cases are complete and pending. The law violators were assessed a total of \$95,984 in fines, plus \$45,860 in court costs in justice courts throughout the state.

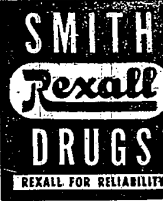

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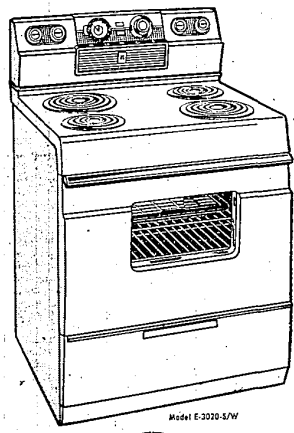

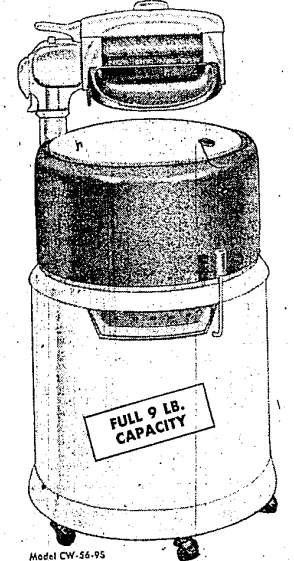
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
