Trojan Lose Out In Final Round Of Tourney Play

After edging out Redford Union in the first round of District Tournament play Friday night, the Clarenceville Trojans fell in defeat to a strong Garden City quintet in the final round, 22-20.

The stellar shooting of Garden City's Mike and Slate who dumped in a total of 46 points between them proved too much for the Trojans to match. Slate hit for 22 while Mike collected 24.

First half play was dominated by neither team with Garden City taking a slight edge on more accurate shooting. In the third cant to the Garden City team surged forward and built up a substantial margin. In the fourth period the Trojans came back and at one point in the contest were within two points of tying the score.

They began to slip again in the last three minutes, however, and Garden City players took good advantage of it to build up their 12 point margin of victory.

Dave Devitt and Dave Hanford shared scoring honors for the losing Trojans with 18 points apiece. In the game with Redford Union Friday night, the Trojans were exceptionally sharp on field goals and set a record by while holding the Redford team defensively.

On free throws, however, they were unable to click while the Redford quintet were dumping them in at the gift toss line. The game ended in a 41-41 tie with a free-throw coming when a foul was committed at the sound of the buzzer. Dave Hanford was elected to try the shot, and made it to give the Trojans the win.

High point man for the Trojans was Dale Devitt who scored 19 points. Assisted by the terrific ball handling and play making of junior Larry Andrews, Devitt hit for the Trojans with precision and regularity.

It was Hanford's night, however. After the winning free throw, the overwhelmed fans carried Hanford off the floor on their shoulders.

Fridays night game was the last game that nine of the players will play in their high school careers. Jerry Porman, Bud Jones, Dave Warriner, Tom Kosty, Tom Drake, Jerry Stainbrook and David Reed, all seniors, concluded their high school careers.

Jones, MacDonald Lead Falcons

The Falcon basketball team concluded basketball play last week being eliminated in the second round of District tournament play.

In regular season conference play the Falcons took third place behind Walled Lake and Berkley. In both conference and non-conference play they ended the season with a record of seven victories against nine losses.

Bud Jones led the team in scoring with 241 points in his credit followed closely by Don MacDonald with 232 points. MacDonald took point-per-game scoring honors, however. He averaged 15.5 points per game and set a new district game scoring record, 35 points in one contest. In 15 games he played in. Jones averaged 15.1 points per game in 15 contests.

Making up the remainder of the top scoring five members on the team this year were Tom Kosty with 104 points to his credit followed by Dave Warriner with 95 and Dave Catpinner with 57.

Every 11 to 15 year old boy who enters the annual Soap Box Derby dreams of having the winners flag waved above his car on Derby Hill at Akron, Ohio.

Applications for this year's Derby are available now at Bill Root's Chevrolet, 3215 Grand River. Any boy between 13 and 15 may enter Class A competition, and those 11-12 in Class B. A boy who is 11 or will not yet be 15 by August 1, is still eligible to compete.

In last year's Derby, eight Farmington boys entered the Detroit races, held at Derby Hill, Outer Drive and Ryan Road. Daniel Brennan, 14, took first prize, a trophy for the fastest Farmington racer and Bob Abalter, 13, also won a bicycle for the second fastest racer.

Springbrook Civic Elects Officers

The spring meeting of Springbrook Civic Association was held Monday night, March 11, at the Middlebelt School under the direction of Don Bowerman, president of the Association. As provided by the association's by-laws, an election committee had been appointed at the last meeting to prepare a slate of candidates for the election of new officers. Record Number Of Deer Killed On State Roads

The number of deer killed by highway traffic in Michigan last year reached a record of more than 22 per cent over the 1955 total. The figure does not include deer which were fatally injured and lost in the woods after accidents.

The traffic hazards created by deer are sharply emphasized by the steady increase in highway deer deaths throughout the state. The reported toll was 2582 in 1955; 1871 in 1954; and 1465 in 1953.

The largest increase in accidental deer deaths was recorded in the upper peninsula, where some 1240 white-tails were killed by cars and trucks, compared with 910 in 1955.

Another 1139 deer met death on highways in the northern lower peninsula, an increase of 372 over the 1955 total.

In the southern lower peninsula, where increasing traffic and the expanding deer herd make conditions especially hazardous, 748 deer were killed on highways.

By area, the largest road kill — 515 deer — resulted in the eastern upper peninsula — an area including Chippewa, Mackinac, Luce and Schoolcraft counties and eastern Alger county.

Many of the year's highway mishaps resulted in injuries to motorists. The serious vehicle damage. Conservation Department officials advise motorists to be on the lookout for deer when traveling state highways and other rural roads, especially at night.

tion to rezone lots 1, 2, 3 and 4 of Tarabusi Roseland! Gardens from Residential One to Commercial. The property is located on the west side of Farmington Road south of Flanders! The rezoning had previously been recommended by the Township Zoning Board and the County Coordinating Committee. The Board also rejected a request for the rezoning from Residential to Commercial of a lot on the west side of Farmington Road just north of North-western Highway. Both the Zoning Board and the Coordinating Committee had recommended the rezoning of the lot. The matter was turned over to the Planning Board for study and recommendations.

A motion was approved by the Board to the effect that the Commercial Land Use Plan submitted by the Planning Committee be adopted in principle for future reference. It was pointed out that an additional ordinance will have to be approved at a later date to make the plan operative. The Board action is simply an endorsement of the principal of the plan. A proposed plat for Halstead Villa, 13 Mile and Halstead Roads, was returned to the Planning Committee for further classification, particularly in regard to the location of a possible school site. The plat includes 337 lots as well as a proposed commercial center.

The Supervisor and Police Chief were authorized to investigate the proposed purchase of a new police car to replace the 1950 Ford. Cost estimates on a new car have been obtained from seven dealers. Some discussion was also held on the possible rental of a police vehicle. The Committee was granted authority to take action.

A petition was received from the property owners on Whitlock Street requesting action to make the street passing to motor traffic. After some discussion, the Clerk was directed to refer the matter to the County Road Commission for immediate action.

Mr. S. A. Broadman, Township Health Officer, reported that he has been receiving complaints regarding the existence of outside toilets in areas where water is available. He asked the Board if it was their intention to enforce the provision of the Health Code prohibiting outside toilets. The Health officer was granted authority to enforce the ordinance where water facilities are available.
