**Gives Tips On
Record Keeping**

Record keeping these busy days is no problem for the efficient housewife. As most of the chores of filling and paying bills fall on her, she will develop a simple but efficient system for storing and filing all family papers.

The first place to put all records is a bulky safety deposit box, but since their space is limited, it is best to keep only records that are difficult to replace or have cash value there. Your marriage license, titles to home and car, insurance policies and military records are then protected from fire or theft.

A simple strong box that can be bought in an office supply store may be used in the home for protecting health certificates, cemetery deeds, bankbooks, guarantees and appliance manuals.

Finally, it is essential to start a record book listing all the home's important documents.

was felt new classrooms would be needed first. Approval regarding the size of the unit proposed was made subject to the results of a study for specific areas now under study by the administration.

A film and series of slides on the subject of the Aluminum building, now being erected in some school districts to provide economical classroom space, were shown under the sponsorship of the Friends of the Community Distributors for the Butler units. The advantages and disadvantages of this type of building were pointed out by a representative from the St. Clair Pardee, architectural firm. St. Johns, Michigan, designers for many of the units of this construction already erected in Michigan. The unit can be constructed cheaper than the conventional type of building.

In other action, the Board authorized the purchase of equipment for the new junior high school from the B. F. Farnel Company, Detroit, at a low bid price of \$53,100.66. Also approved was the purchase of plastic eating ware for the new junior high and two new elementary schools to open in September from the Frank Glass Company of Pleasant Ridge at a price of \$2,570.30.

A proposal by the Novi School District to incorporate a small portion of the Farmington School District in Novi and transfer another small portion of the Novi District in Farmington Township to Farmington was approved by the Board.

James Reed, assistant superintendent, reported that two more break-ins at separate elementary schools in the District had been made recently. He indicated, however, that the teenage burglar had been apprehended. Damage at both schools was slight, he said, and only minor items were taken. It was suggested by Trustee Vernon Fisher that the administration consider having night lights installed in the principal's office at the various schools as a possible means of helping to discourage break-ins.

See School property as suggested would have to be done on a special assessment basis, the Township Board pointed out. An effort will be made to have this done, the Township Board promised. Township officials also agreed to consider favorably the construction of Colgate, Tulane or Purdue Streets north to Shiawassee Road.

In hopes of reducing traffic speed in the vicinity of the Board School, the Township will check into the possibility of having some type of flasher-stop light installed on Orchard Lake Road at 13 Mile Road. Also to be checked will be the possibility of providing a safer walking route between Germaine and Edgell on the west side of Middlebelt Road for children walking to the Middlebelt School.

To improve walking conditions in the vicinity of the Board School, the Township will check into the possibility of having some type of flasher-stop light installed on Orchard Lake Road at 13 Mile Road. Also to be checked will be the possibility of providing a safer walking route between Germaine and Edgell on the west side of Middlebelt Road for children walking to the Middlebelt School.

In general discussion, Albert Gain, Township Supervisor, stated that it would be impossible for the Township to provide police or guard protection for children at dangerous crossings in the Township. He indicated, however, that the Township would have no objections to the School Board hiring such guards but that permission to have them would have to be obtained through the Oakland County Sheriff's Department.

To help the School Board in determining where new schools will be needed, the Township Board agreed to supply school officials with plat plans for new subdivisions within a Township section, but that a school could be reached within a section without students having to walk out to a main road.

Upon the recommendation of Roland Clifford, School Board Treasurer, Township officials also promised to consider the possibility of purchasing additional land adjacent to school sites for Township recreational areas.

**TWO INJURED WHEN
SEMI-TRUCK HITS
CAR, ROLLS OVER**

Two Pontiac residents were injured early last Wednesday morning when the car in which they were traveling was struck by a semi-truck on Grand River Avenue at the Middlebelt Road intersection. The accident occurred at 3:35 a.m.

Rose Marentette, 31, and her son Lawrence, Jr., 2, were both taken to Redford Receiving Hospital suffering from shock. Lawrence Marentette, driver of the car, and James Carr of Romulus, driver of the truck, were not injured.

According to police, Marentette apparently failed to notice the second red flasher while proceeding across Grand River on Middlebelt and pulled directly into the path of the semi-truck. When Carr applied his brakes and swung to the right in an effort to avoid the crash, the semi tipped over on its side.

**The Handyman's
NOTEBOOK**
by BAYARD TUPPER

Handymen often ask our advice about the best types of wood for furniture. Here, then, are a few notes about the major species.

WHITE PINE is one of the most popular choices for amateur handymen because it is medium soft and easy to work. Light in color, it has a fairly straight, inconspicuous grain. It will take paint, stain or enamel equally well.

MAPLE, especially popular with lovers of Early American designs, is fairly easy to work. It is noted for its interesting grain patterns and is usually finished in natural wood or with stain.

WALNUT is a frequent choice of amateur and professional furniture-makers alike, because it is moderately hard yet fairly easy to cut. Its attractive grain calls for a natural finish or stain.

MAHOGANY rivals walnut in popularity for good quality furniture. Since it is moderately hard and has several attractive grain patterns, it is often used for veneers. Its commonest color, reddish brown, is usually finished with stain or in natural wood.

OAK makes sturdy and attractive furniture if you have the skill and patience to work it successfully. White oak is the kind most commonly used, and many attractive finishes are possible, including, stained, weathered, driftwood, mission and period.

CHERRY, though medium hard, can be worked fairly easily and once dry, will not warp. Color, reddish tan; grain, wavy; usual finishes, natural or stain.

BIRCH comes in three varieties, with red birch the most popular. It is hard, close grained and good for turning because it does not split. It can be finished in natural or stained to resemble mahogany.
