- PRECINCT NO. 1** — Farmington Junior High Cafeteria, 33000 Thomas
- PRECINCT NO. 2** — American Legion Home, 31775 Grand River Ave.
- PRECINCT NO. 3** — Farmington Senior High School, 32000 Shiawassee

FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELECTING THE FOLLOWING OFFICERS, VIZ:

#### STATE OFFICERS

Two Regents of the University of Michigan, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Member of the State Board of Education, Two Members of the State Board of Agriculture, State Highway Commissioner.

#### NON-PARTISAN OFFICERS

Two Justices of the Supreme Court (For Terms Ending December 31, 1965); One Justice of the Supreme Court (For Term Ending December 31, 1959).

#### CITY OFFICERS

Three Councilmen, Municipal Judge for six (6) year term, Associate Municipal Judge for six (6) year term.

AND TO VOTE ON THE FOLLOWING PROPOSITION:

Pursuant to Miscellaneous Resolution 3185 by the Oakland County Board of Supervisors, the following proposition will be submitted to the qualified electors of Oakland County at the Biennial Spring Election on April 1, 1957:

"Shall the provisions of sections one hundred fifty (150), one hundred fifty-one (151), one hundred fifty-two (152), one hundred fifty-three (153), one hundred fifty-four (154), and one hundred fifty-five (155) of chapter two (2) of act number three hundred fourteen (314) of the public acts of nineteen hundred fifteen (1915), providing for a Board of Jury Commissioners, be adopted by this County?"

AND ALSO TO VOTE ON THE FOLLOWING PROPOSITIONS:

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1

Shall the City of Farmington annex 170 acres of land in Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan?

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2

Shall the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) and issue General Obligation Bonds of the City therefor, for the purpose of paying the cost of acquiring and constructing a Public Works building within the City?

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3

Shall the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) and issue General Obligation Bonds of the City therefor, for the purpose of paying the cost of acquiring and purchasing Public Works equipment consisting of trucks, street sweepers and street maintenance equipment?
