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Scout Day Camp Plans Underway, Need Counselors

Plans are already underway for Southern Oakland County Girl Scouts and Brownies to enjoy camping experiences this summer at the Council's Day Camp, Indianwood, 12 miles north of Pontiac at Indianwood and Baldwin Roads.

Over 900 Girl Scouts and Brownies from ages 7 to 17 will be accommodated at the camp this summer, it was indicated by scout officials. Four camping sessions will be held running from mid-June to mid-August. Each session will be eight days long.

Over 200 volunteer counselors will work at the camp. Scouts will learn to build fires, cook meals, learn special campcraft skills and study nature first hand. There will be a unit for the handicapped girls in the third session and a new French-speaking unit will be offered. A new rain shelter is being built and will be ready in time for the camp's opening, officials said.

Persons wishing to serve as counselors at the camp are urged to get in touch with their neighborhood chairman or contact the Girl Scout office, 500 South Washington Building, Royal Oak, Phone Lincoln 7-6616 and ask for the Day Camp staff recruiting chairman.

Training courses will be given for persons wishing to be counselors in April and May. Volunteers will have the option of selecting the session which best suits their summer schedule and will be assigned with another counselor to handle a unit of 14 to 16 girls in the age group and program level of their preference; it was pointed out. Transportation to and from Day Camp will be provided free for counselors and nursery units will be provided for young children of counselors.

Plant Shrubs Far Enough Away To Grow

If you are planning to plant some shrubs around your house, be sure to get them far enough away from the wall, advises Joe Cox, Michigan State University extension specialist in landscape architecture.

Two main problems arise from planting too close to the house: they are crowding of the plants and lack of water.

If a shrub is planted too close to the house when it's small, it will crowd up to the walls when it is mature. It should be far enough away from the wall that it will not have to be pruned and trimmed away when it matures.

The other problem, lack of water, is a result of the cover on the house taking moisture away from the plants. The building protects the shrubs from much of the rain from which they might otherwise benefit.

Many persons like to plant shrubs one and one half times as far away from the building as their mature diameter. In other words, if a plant will mature to four feet in diameter, it should be planted six feet from the wall.


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The decision of Arthur Maxwell
