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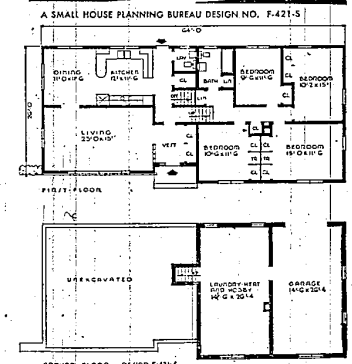
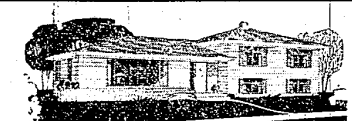

The Handyman's NOTEBOOK

HAVE YOU TRIED ALUMINUM YET?
Hands up—all those who haven't yet discovered all the attractive permanent projects you can carry out with easy-to-use, do-it-yourself aluminum.

I suspect there are a lot of people who are real whizzes at many kinds of woodwork but shudder at the thought of tackling a job involving metal. Aluminum is metal, of course, and it acts like metal except for two very important distinctions: it doesn't rust, and it can be worked just as easily as wood.

So, for further proof, here are a few tips on how to handle aluminum whether you happen to be planning to use it outside, such as for framework of that patio awning, or are contemplating a piece of the endless number of other items that can be made from it.

To cut sheet aluminum, use any household scissors; to cut rod, tubing, angle or bar stock, use any moderately fine saw—either an ordinary hand saw or a coping saw. Any wood or auger bit will drill holes in aluminum, but it's best to back up the metal with a piece of scrap wood.

To bend sheet, bar or angle aluminum, use a block of wood as a form around which to make the turn. The block will get best results if you tap the bending edge lightly with a rubber or wooden mallet or a plastic-tipped hammer. Rough edges are no problem. They can be smoothed with a plane or with sandpaper, emery cloth or a planer.

The best fastenings are aluminum nails, rivets, bolts or screws, since they won't rust.
