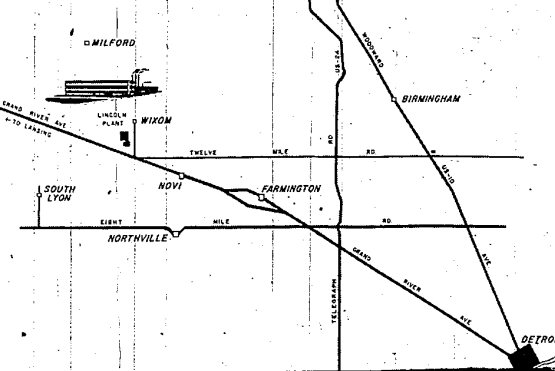

NEW NATIONAL headquarters for the Lincoln Division of Ford Motor Company, shown on map above, opened Monday, April 15, is one of the largest automotive assembly plants built in Michigan since World War II. Approximately 5,000 employees, with an annual payroll of about \$30,000,000, will work in the general offices and manufacturing plant, which is the center for the administration, production and sale of Lincoln automobiles. It is located 28 miles northwest of downtown Detroit on the northward side of Grand River (U. S. 16) and Wixom Road.

New Lincoln Plant At Wixom Finished In Record Time

An all-time construction record was established with the completion of the new national headquarters of the Lincoln Division in the Novi-Wixom area. Ford Motor Company officials indicated.

From start of construction through installation of equipment in the completed building was the shortest time in company history for any project of similar size. Ground was broken December 2, 1955. Monday, April 15, the division's 13 days later, the division's employees reported for work in the new facility.

This feat was accomplished under adverse weather conditions and a 23-day steel strike, it was pointed out.

The new Lincoln facilities are a second only in size to Ford's Main Building in Dearborn. The Rouge plants in the company's system of 21 assembly plants. The plant, whose annual capacity will approximate 100,000 units on a straight-line basis, was a specifically designed to build Lincoln automobiles and was constructed to permit expansion readily.

More than 200 contractors, employing 2,500 men in all construction trades graded the terrain, dug foundations, erected steel, poured concrete and installed equipment.

The three-story general office building was built by the lift-slab method of construction, one of the largest jobs completed in the industry. In this method, the concrete floors are poured at ground level and later lifted into place by hydraulic jacks.

The new Lincoln facilities were built on a 35-acre site, the largest company industrial site outside the world-famous Rouge.

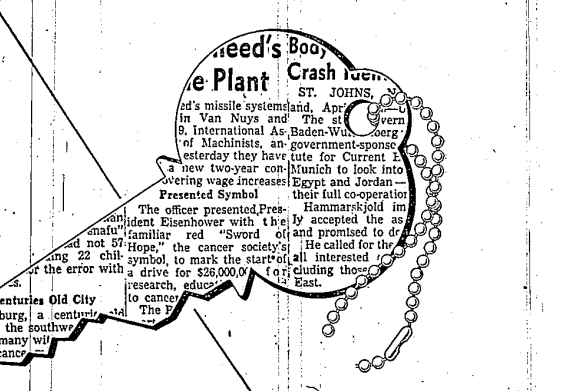
