Under Michigan law each container of field or lawn seed must bear a tag or label stating the purity, germination and recent date of test of the seed it contains.

The Handyman's NOTEBOOK

HOW WERE YOUR FUEL BILLS LAST WINTER?

That may not seem like a very timely question, but the fact is that unless you take steps during the mild or warm weather to weather-proof your home, it will be too late to do anything about it for another season. So now is the time to do everything you can to cut drafts and eliminate everything else that might contribute to a loss of heat in winter.

Ill-fitting windows and doors are often a great source of heat loss, and they can often be remedied with a bit of ingenuity. The first step is to check for gaps around the frames. If you're taking it for granted that you already have adequate storm windows; but if not, you may not realize that you can both materials and fuel by making a set of storm windows. We'll be glad to give you more help and information if you ask us about this.

Attics and chimneys are two common trouble spots, so it pays to check for any openings that are not supposed to be there.

If your house is not already fully insulated, you should consider doing this yourself or having it done to let it depend on the type of construction you have. This is a bigger job than the others I have mentioned, but not so big as you may think, and it will pay dividends in fuel savings and comfort.

The main thing is not to keep putting off these jobs—little or big—because you will find they are either very difficult or completely impossible during the cold weather.

You can beat the cold weather problem only if you take the initiative and start the fight against Old King Winter right now.

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crete curbs with the road sloping north to an open creek to take care of surface drainage. Following the survey it was found that laying the road without sewer lines would not be practical. Sheriffs pointed out it was also found that installing concrete curbing would be extremely costly, he added.

Revisions recommended by the Council and residents on the street in attendance at the hearing called for installing sewer lines needed and the use of asphalt rather than concrete curbing. Base material for the road will be taken from Floral and that part of Lilac to be paved thus providing a sufficient savings to lay sewer line without increasing the originally estimated cost of the project. Estimated cost of the work has been set at \$17,185.00 or \$3.90 per front foot.

Property owners were informed that work would probably not be started on the paving projects until the later part of July or first part of August. Scheriffs assured residents that though the costs indicated, were only estimates, they were set high enough so that increases would not be likely. He further assured that if prices did turn considerably higher, work would not be started until property owners had a chance to reconsider.

In answer to questions from property owners, it was pointed out that that costs could be paid over a year period or in a lump sum and that the interest rate would be six percent of the unpaid balance each year. Scheriffs stated that his first payments would probably be asked for in July and would include year interest rates for the first year in advance.

Following questioning, it was pointed out that the cost per front foot for paving Floral was higher than for Lilac because a larger sewer line would be needed from Astor to Nine Mile on the longer street.

In a separate hearing the pending question of vacating a portion of the road at the intersection of Valleyview Drive was further discussed but no action taken.

Conservation Department director Gerald E. Eddy recently granted permission to the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service to install, maintain, or operate "seals, traps, and electrical devices" in 90 streams tributary to the Great Lakes for control and suppression of sea lampreys.
