Debates In Final College Contest

Competing in the finals of the fourth annual inter-fraternity debating competition for the Wilmot Brookings Mitchell Trophy at Bowdoin College, Brunswick, Maine, on Wednesday, April 10, was Nicholas G. Spicer of Farmington.

Spicer was one of two contestants representing Alpha Delta Phi fraternity.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Spicer of 24915 Farmington Road, Spicer is a member of the dramatics club, on the dean's list and enrolled in the Reserve Officer Training Corps unit. He was on the freshman cross-country and track teams and won his numerals in both.

A graduate of Farmington High School where he was a class officer and on the track team, he is a member of the National Honor Society.

Since last November the twelve fraternities and the non-fraternity group at Bowdoin have been meeting in a series of elimination debates, brief and informally conducted.

The Mitchell Trophy was given by an anonymous donor in recognition of Professor Mitchell's contribution to the growth of interest in the speech arts, particularly in debating, during his forty-six years in the wish of the donor to encourage undergraduate interest in topics of current concern and to stimulate informal debate and discussion on the campus.

Professor Mitchell was graduated from Bowdoin in 1890 and returned to his alma mater in 1893 as an instructor in Rhetoric. Four years later he became Edward Little Professor of Rhetoric and Oratory, a position he held until his retirement in 1933. Now 89 years of age, he still lives in Brunswick except for the winter months.

It was indicated that the Temple Association is making every effort to get work underway on the building this spring.

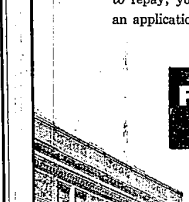
Chairman of the bond drive, Joe Brodie, reported that his group is working in close support with the Temple Association and that members are continuing purchases in support of their proposed lodge.
