Select asparagus carefully, says Consumer Marketing Information Agent, Mrs. Josephine Lawyer. Are the tips tight and compact? Are they rich purplish-blue color? Are the stalks firm and green? If more than a small portion of the bottom of the stalk is whitish green in color, there will be quite a waste loss. While a pound of fresh green asparagus will serve 3 or 4, woody asparagus may serve only 2 or 3.

The Lincoln Division of Ford Motor Company will open its new national headquarters, including the most modern car assembly facilities in the automobile industry, Monday, April 15 in the Novi-Wixom area, 28 miles northwest of downtown Detroit.

The new Lincoln facilities include a 200,000 square foot brick and glass, three-story office building; a 1,300,000 square foot assembly plant, test track, and power plant. The new headquarters give Lincoln, for the first time in its history, completely separate facilities for the administration, production, and distribution of its cars.

The majority of the division employees recently housed in the Ford Rouge area in Dearborn, will be moved into the new Lincoln headquarters over the weekend, joining the manufacturing cadre that moved a month ago.

Nearly 5,000 persons will be employed at peak periods, with an annual payroll of approximately \$20 million, company officials said. Full operation will be reached with the start of production of 1958 models in late summer. Capacity of the new plant on eight-time — is approximately 112,000 cars a year.

The combined general office building and manufacturing plant — 35 acres under roof — is one of the largest and most complete automotive facilities built in Michigan since World War II.

Four cafeterias and two dining rooms will seat more than 1,600 persons at one time. A fully equipped hospital with ambulance will be staffed by a doctor and five nurses.

An experienced plant protection organization will police the facilities. Fire protection will be furnished by a modern fully-equipped fire truck and a small but also fully equipped vehicle capable of driving into any area of the plant.

Convenient, paved parking facilities will handle 3,500 cars.

When the new Lincoln headquarters starts operations Monday, it will be just two years since Lincoln was separated from the Mercury Division and authorized as a full scale division in its own right.

Lincoln's history, however, dates back to 1920, when the first Lincoln was produced by the Lincoln Motor Car Company, organized by Henry Leland.

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A LOT OF MAN-HOURS are spelled out in this report being examined by officials of the Temporary League of Subdivision Associations.
