March Of Dimes
Drive In County
Nets Over \$141,000

Oakland County's 1957 March of Dimes held in January raised over \$141,000 in it's fight against polio, a report issued by the County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis revealed.

"This is a decrease from the 1956 March of Dimes, due primarily to the fact that some of the four of polio has been removed because of the Salk vaccine, it was indicated.

The Reverend G. Burton Hodgson, Chairman of the Oakland County Chapter, stated that the March of Dimes is the sole support for the work of The National Foundation which has responsibility for over 240 patients in Oakland County for some type of rehabilitation program.

"In addition to this," he said, "the research program on a national basis must be continued even though the present vaccine is highly effective. In the country at large there are more than 80,000 polio victims receiving patient care from the Foundation. Because of the many polio victims who must have care for the rest of their lives, we feel that polio is not licked until this job is done."

Hodgson extended the thanks of the Oakland County Chapter to its more than 12,000 volunteers who gave generously of their time and effort to carry on this fight.

A part of March of Dimes funds will be used to extend the immunization program in the county. In conjunction with the doctors of Oakland County, an extensive campaign is now being started to be sure that everyone in the county up to fifty years of age is urged to receive immunization against polio, Hodgson concluded.

At Livonia Methodist

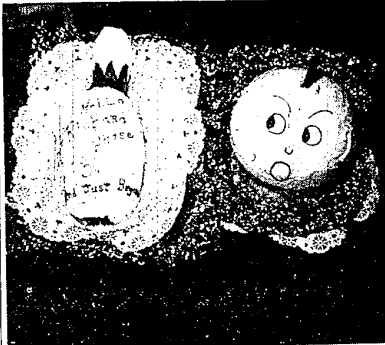

Otto DeWard, Conservation Department district game supervisor at Newberry, said tracks in a Carp River deer swamp southwest of Trout Lake indicate the small herd.

He and Joseph Vogt, a Department deer biologist, found tracks of the moose in the snow. They said there were a large number of tracks, but these were probably made by only a few animals, "perhaps two or three."

This is the second winter moose tracks were found in the area.
