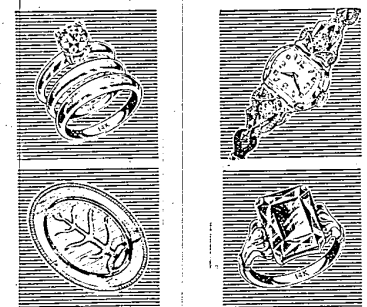

North Farmington Little League Hopefuls To Begin Practice May 4

Plans for the first season of regulation play in the newly organized North Farmington Little League were outlined to parents living north of Eleven Mile Road and their sons at a rally held last week.

All details have now been worked out, league officials indicated, with spring training scheduled to begin this Saturday morning, May 4, at the Bond and Eagle elementary school playgrounds. Through the work of various committees, six sponsors have contributed substantial sums, a site for a baseball diamond has been lined up, managers have been selected, officers elected and umpires chosen, officials stated. Approximately 200 boys have already registered to play in the new four team league and farm system, they added.

The need for the new league became apparent some time ago because of the increasing number of new families moving into the area. It was certain that another League would be necessary if boys in the north Farmington area were to have an opportunity to play baseball in Little League during the summer.

During the 1956 season several baseball minded people in the North Farmington area, aware of the need, worked up a Little League farm system of teams playing at Eagle School and Bond School. This group of men were aided by the leaders of the City's Little League in many ways so they would have experience to use in organizing their own league this year.

The move proved to be a wise and foresighted one for the experience helped the group of leaders who met during the winter months to formulate plans for a North Farmington League. After many organization meetings application to the national office of the Little League for a coveted and hard-to-acquire charter was made. The charter for the North Farmington Little League has now been obtained.
