Help Week Project

Several hundred fraternity and sorority pledges at the University of Michigan are now staging their annual "Help Week" this week to prepare the U.M.'s Fresh Air Camp for the summer session.

Secretary of the "Help Week" project is LaForrest Holladay, daughter of F. E. Holladay of 31-021 Glenview Drive. Miss Holladay is a freshman in the College of Literature, Science and the Arts and a member of the Collegiate Sorority sorority.

The freshmen and sophomore pledges are being transported by busses to and from the camp located on Patterson Lake about 24 miles northwest of Ann Arbor near Pinckney each afternoon for general clean-up work including painting, scrubbing, raking and repairing.

The students raise funds for the camp project by sponsoring the Cinema Guild movie and through the Campus Chest, which will be in operation for the first time this spring. All funds not used during "Help Week" are donated for food, medical care, craft and camping supplies, camper transportation and athletic equipment.

The camp is a unit of the Institute for Human Adjustment, and provides supervised camping experience for boys who, by reason of economic limitation and behavior problems, would not otherwise have a camping opportunity. About 250 emotionally disturbed boys are referred from social agencies throughout Michigan to the camp, where they gain an integrated experience under expert supervision.
