

## Takes Training At Distillery

"Doctor of Distilled Spirits" is the way Frank Kirby, 2408 Altz, Lona Drive, Farmington, might be described now that he has completed the technical seminar at the Hiram Walker distillery in Peoria, Illinois.

Kirby, who is a supervisor for Hiram Walker, Incorporated, took the course in the belief that those who teach others how to merchandise alcoholic beverages should themselves be thoroughly schooled in all phases of the business.

Hiram Walker distillery personnel, as well as members of its distributor organization, are brought in small groups to the plant and given an intensive two-week course in all phases of fine whiskey-making, from grain selection through bottling. The men work as well as listen. They don distillery uniforms and actually to the work of plant technicians.

According to president, Ross Corbit, the decision to conduct such a program resulted from a careful study of sales techniques employed in many lines of business in which sales executives obtain a broader appreciation of the care and manufacturing skill that goes into the products they sell, and places them in a better position to transmit this knowledge to others.

ers is the brightest hope for easing Michigan's unemployment situation, says Director Max Horton of the State Employment Security Commission.

Some 45 per cent of the state's jobless have only an elementary education, Horton told a House Labor Committee. Studies show that approximately three-fourths have not completed high school.

Bills proposing a vocational training program and a counseling service recommended by Horton are under consideration by the Legislature.

The money to finance these programs, \$350,000, would come from funds the federal government collected in taxes from Michigan for unemployment compensation. This money, far in excess of actual administrative costs, is being returned to the state.

**BACK FROM BELGIUM**, former ambassador Fred M. Alger, Jr., indicates he is still interested in Michigan politics and the Republican party.

Alger left the state political scene in 1953 when he received an appointment to the Brussels post by President Eisenhower. Before that he served as Michigan's Secretary of State for six years and was defeated in 1952 in his bid for the governor's chair.

Alger barely unlocked the door to his Grosse Pointe home before friends began pointing to the man, the name and the possibility that he would be a GOP candidate to oppose Senator Pat McNamara in 1960.

**ACTUAL CONSTRUCTION** of the Mackinac bridge was resumed last week after a winter of preparation.

First order of business will be to link the peninsulas with the two continuous truss spans that will eventually support the 48-foot roadway from the shore to the cable towers that will hold the suspension part of the bridge.

Summer visitors will see the five-mile bridge completely spanning the water between St. Ignace and Mackinaw City.

But it will be until November before residents, tourists and hunters will be able to make a 10 minute car trip across the bridge. Until then, the majestic sight of the span's construction will lure many visitors.

## Urge Community To Plan Forum On Livelihood

Michigan Week chairman for Oakland County, Thomas F. Withern, recently issued a plea urging communities to hold forums on "Our Livelihood Day" during the week on what Michigan and their own regions need in order to assure a better livelihood for the people of the state ten years hence.

Livelihood Day will be observed on Wednesday, May 22. Hopes are that a forum will be held in each community in the county.

Each day of Michigan Week has a special designation starting on Sunday, May 19, which is "Spiritual Foundations Day" and closing on Saturday, May 25, which is "New Frontiers Day."

"Livelihood Day" is arranged is entirely up to the local community. Withern stated. It is assured that in a number of towns the forum will be in the form of a panel program at the luncheon of one of the service clubs holding its weekly meeting that day.

"The state committee on 'Livelihood Day' anticipates that a number of communities will arrange for high school students to take part in the forum at school assemblies since the subject has to do with Michigan ten years from now when high school students will be out earning their livings. No group this spring will be more concerned with livelihood Michigan holds for its people in 1967 than these high school students, it was pointed out.
