## Trojans Win Over West Bloomfield On Costly Error

Clarencville's baseball team made it three straight victories in engaging West Bloomfield last Monday by downing West Bloomfield 5-4. The victory left the Trojans the only unbeaten team in the Wayne-Oakland League.

West Bloomfield outbatted Clarencville 5-4 but a costly error in the second inning gave the Trojans two runs which proved to be the victory margin. The error occurred with Trojan runners on second and third with two out.

Johnny Lucadam was on the mound for West Bloomfield when he was popped one up over second base. With two out, the runners were moving and both were home when the shortstop dropped the ball.

Larry Andrews started on the mound for Clarencville and was awarded for three runs in the first inning before Coach Inani brought in Melburne Turnbull. Turnbull allowed the Lakers only two hits and one run throughout the remainder of the game.

Clarencville won the ball game in the top of the sixth inning when Dale Devitt stole second, moved to third on an infield-out and rode the winning run off the bat of Cliff Wellman's single to left. Leand Turnbull got the victory, his second of the year. Lucadam suffered the loss.

## Flood Survey For 3 County Area Planned

Favorable action by the Secretary of the Army is expected to stage a flood survey for Oakland, Wayne and Macomb counties.

Congressman William S. Broomfield of Detroit said today that Army Secretary Wilbur M. Brucker's action "undoubtedly will help our cause with the public works committee."

Broomfield has been seeking the flood control study to determine whether streams and rivers flowing into Lake St. Clair and the Detroit river are adequate in size to handle storm water once proposed drainage networks are built.

Brucker, in a letter to the chairman of the House public works committee of which Broomfield is a member, said "continued development" of the Detroit Metropolitan area will "naturally increase the flow of the streams flowing into Lake St. Clair and Detroit River."

He said "serious damage" has occurred throughout the Detroit Metropolitan area, "and much of the flooded area includes extensive residential and commercial development."

Local drainage problems have been created in many of the urban areas as a result of a marked increase in the amount of land development," said Brucker.

The U. S. Army report estimates to total cost of the study will be \$50,000.

Broomfield said the bureau of the budget also had no objection to the Army's favorable report.

## Area Candidates For Air Force Academy Sought By Broomfield

Ten cadets for the U. S. Air Force Academy are being sought by Congressman William S. Broomfield (R-Royal Oak).

Broomfield said so far only six Oakland County youths have applied for entrance to the Air Force Academy in 1958, although he has 10 vacancies to fill. He is going to have to have a lot more applicants if we are to fill our quota with the best men available," he said.

Candidates face a tough medical and mental examination before they are eligible to become cadets in the Air Force's new school at Colorado Springs, Colorado. The new academy is air power's equivalent to West Point and Annapolis.

The tests start with a general civil service examination to be given in a number of Michigan communities on July 15. The new Air Force Academy will eventually supply half of the career officers in the air arm, which is assuming an ever-increasing importance in our Nation's defense.

Eligibility requirements for the Academy are strict. The applicant must be:

- 1. A citizen of the United States.

2. Of good moral character. 3. At least 17 years old and not yet 22 as of July 1 of the year of his admittance to the Academy. 4. Unmarried, and must never have been married. 5. Medically qualified for flying training.

Youths meeting the above qualifications are asked to write Congressman Broomfield, Room 422, New House Office Building, Washington, D. C.
