Dem Caucus Backs Sreen

PONTIAC Commissioner Lawrence Pernick (D-Southfield) says Republican commissioners are behind Sheriff Johannes Sreen in his efforts to carry out law enforcement in the county.

The board's nine-member Democratic Caucus, which represents a third of the entire board, recently endorsed a resolution supporting the sheriff and applauding his efforts to keep politics out of law enforcement. They strongly suggested that it behooves the entire board to respond in the same manner to Sreen's programs to rid the county of crime.

Sreen, a Democrat, has been refused two requests for additional personnel by Republican commissioners who dominate the board. At one point Sreen was also accused of malfeasance and running an unsafe jail by Commissioner Donald Quinn (R-Troy).

Sreen feels the board isn't giving him the support he needs to carry out an effective law enforcement program. He says it's all because of politics.

FARMINGTON Sue Ann Johnson of Farmington has been approved as a graduate student teaching assistant at Idaho State University. She will teach in the English department.

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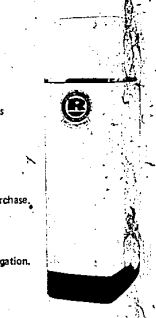
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
