State Fishing License Costs Below Average

The cost of a resident fishing license ranges from 90 cents to \$6 in the various states of the nation, according to a recent Ohio survey. The average license cost in the U.S. is \$2.32 for a resident angler.

In Michigan — one of the nation's most popular fishing states — a resident fishing license costs \$1.50. Proposed fee increases would boost this price to only \$2.

Gives Tips On Carving Roast

Roast turkey or duck, succulent chicken or Cornish game hens make taste-appelling main dishes says Faye Kinder, Michigan State University home economist. Carving these birds need not be a big job if you follow a few easy steps, she added.

Using a carving knife with a seven to nine inch blade, remove the legs from the bird by cutting the skin between the leg and the body. Gently pull the leg away while cutting through the skin on the back.

Next, separate the thigh and drumstick but cutting through the joint. Chicken, duck and goose legs are served without further carving. Turkey legs and thighs should be cut into thin slices parallel to the bones.

To carve the white meat, make a deep cut into the breast close to the wing and parallel to it. Then cut thin slices down to this cut beginning about half-way between it and the ridge of the breastbone.

Always serve both white and a dark meat to everyone unless some of your guests have definite preferences, adds Miss Kinder.
