Points Out Need For Daily Supply Of Proteins

When planning menus for your family, remember that proteins are a daily need for all diets. Faye Kinder of Michigan State University's College of Home Economics explains the role of proteins in our diet.

Protein is the building material for our bodies, and because the body has no way of storing this important nutrient, we must keep replenishing the supply with our daily meals.

Some of the foods especially rich in protein are meats, fish and poultry. Eggs, milk and cheese are also good sources of protein but do not contain as much as the first group.

You may also use legumes, nuts and cereal grains for part of your daily protein requirement. Proteins from animal sources are better than those from plant sources, however; you can combine foods from both these sources to get a good mixture.

When you serve oatmeal and milk, macaroni and cheese or spaghetti and meat sauce, you are giving your family good combinations of these two kinds of proteins.

It is a good idea, nutritionwise, to divide the supply of protein between the meals of the day, and always have some in the breakfast meal.

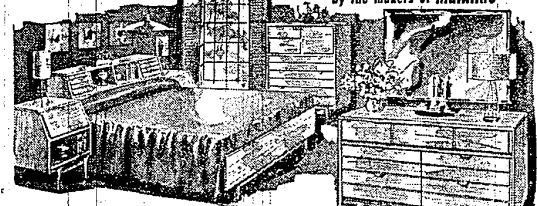
