Air Express Now Offered Direct Service To And From Airports

The extension of direct service to and from airports for this area was announced by the Railway Express Agency the latter part of this week.

The new service went into effect on Monday, May 20, Leonard Millross, area agent of the Railway Express Agency, disclosed. Areas to be provided this service besides Farmington will be Plymouth, Livonia, Northville, Novi and Milford.

Provided by the new service will be the fastest means of transportation at a cost reduction due to discontinuance of the rail charge, 15¢.

Millross pointed out. Air express reaches over 1800 airport points and 21,000 off airline points, served by 1325 of the most modern airlines providing 10,212 daily scheduled flight departures in United States, Canada, Alaska, Hawaii, Cuba, Western Europe, the Middle and Far East. Shipments will arrive within a few hours from time shipped through fast, co-ordinated ground work provided by 12,500 vehicles.
