ed out that the hill is frequently closed for brief periods during the winter months because of ice and snow. Under the new plan most of the sharp grade will be eliminated thus relieving this situation.

In compliance with another objection from the Council, lots in the southern half of the subdivision have been increased to provide a minimum width of approximately 40 feet. The Council explained that only tentative approval of the subdivision lot and street layout is being given at this time in order that the developer can proceed with more detailed plans. The completed plan, including drainage, sewer and water facilities, will have to be submitted to the Council for final approval.

member of the Board would object to the proposal. A proposal at the beginning of this year. Stephenson suggested at one point that a five year audit be made but added that he would be willing to start the program as of April 1, 1957. Brown stated that it might be difficult to justify the expense of a five or six year audit unless there was substantial evidence to warrant such action. It was suggested that this matter be discussed more fully at the planned conference.

Proposed improvements of the bridges on Drake Road south of Howard Road and Nine Mile Road west of Farmington Road, were discussed in detail by the Board. Stephenson stated that approximately \$11,000 in County Township matched funds were available for road construction work. Elise Avery suggested that before any action was taken that consideration be given to the construction of a foot bridge across the creek near the Gill Road School. Stephenson added that in his opinion the funds might be better spent for ditching throughout the Township. It was moved that the matter be referred to the Road Committee for study and recommendation.

Stephenson reported that upon examination by legal counsel it appears that no action can be taken to recover the 170 acres of land which was recently abandoned by the city. The Supervisor had indicated earlier that there might be a loophole by which the Township could petition for the return of this property. He added that in the future every effort should be made to prevent such loss of valuable land.

The Supervisor stated that according to a recent Attorney General's opinion it is illegal for the Township to employ a firm of appraisers. The Board, at a previous meeting, agreed to consider the hiring of such a firm in order to speed up the reappraisal of property in the Township.

ment had been reached to obtain Detroit water from the Section 38 water system for the new elementary school being erected on Shawwassee Road just east of Middlebelt. An eight inch water main to the school will be laid, he said. A water shortage which temporarily stopped construction on the new school recently has been corrected, he informed the Board. Water is now being pumped to the site from a nearby creek.

A request that a walking easement from residential property to the new O. E. Dunckel Junior high site was denied by the resolution of the Board following discussion. Trustee Douglas Hamill raised the strongest objection to closing off the easement. He contended that such a move would force several youngsters to walk on busily traveled 12 Mile Road to reach the school. Unanimous approval was given to a proposal calling for the erection of fencing around the Junior high grounds. Superintendent Dunckel was instructed to develop a plan to negotiate terms for the erection of fencing.

Considerable concern was expressed by the Board over a recent report filed by the building advisory group of the School Advisory Committee in discussion with Theodor Lapinski, advisory group representative. The report, which cited schools which had been built much cheaper than those being constructed in Farmington, was filled with discrepancies. Board members pointed out. Several of the discrepancies were indicated. Lapinski was instructed to inform members of the building advisory group that any suggestions or reports made would be welcomed by the Board provided they were based on fact and thoroughly checked before being submitted.

In other action, the Board approved the purchase of furniture and shop equipment needed for new schools as recommended by the administration and appointed an election board to serve for the coming school election. Also approved was a resolution permitting two foreign students to be enrolled here for the next school year.

The Handyman's NOTEBOOK

ODDS 'N' ENDS

Ever get down to the bottom of a drawer you're cleaning out and find a lot of little odds and ends you don't know what to do with?

Well, it happens with column-writing, too, as I've lately found out, for I often get an idea that isn't worth a whole column and still worth passing along. So hold still for a minute while I dump some odds and ends in your lap:

If you need a good strong clamp sometime to hold a small piece of work steady, your bench vice won't do and you haven't any vice grips, use an ordinary pair of blue-handled pliers and wrap a heavy rubber band around the handles after setting the work in the jaws of the pliers...

Are you a clumsy type of fellow who seldom paints without kicking the paint can over at least once? Then always make it a point (after mixing the paint thoroughly) to dole out a little paint at a time into any appropriate container, keeping the original paint can in a safe place—with the lid securely fastened.

And, speaking of painting problems, you can often get paint remover into awkward nooks and crannies on flimsy furniture if you dip a heavy piece of cord into said paint remover, then work it back and forth the way a dentist cleans teeth with dental floss...

And, say, before you knock yourself out trying to dust off a window sill before painting it, just go over it with a small dry paint brush, which will get into the corner about as well as anything... You can get better results with your sink plunger if you coat the flat bottom edge with petroleum jelly to improve the suction.
