**Ground Covers Aid Lawn Care**

Properly chosen and cared for ground covers can add to the landscape beauty of a yard and cut the time needed for care, says Joe Cox, extension specialist in landscape architecture at Michigan State University.

Ground cover plants are generally used in masses to cover a bare patch of ground or where trees are dense or low to the ground making it difficult to maintain a good lawn. Ground covers may be used on open, sunny, or shady soil, too, he added.

Plants having a sprawling, creeping or prostrate habit of growth fit into use as ground covers. Cox suggests these plants as suitable for ground covers under Michigan conditions:

For shady conditions and year-around color, periwinkle or myrtle, baltic ivy, Japanese pachyandra and carpet bugle. All are under six inches in height except myrtle which is under one foot. Myrtle is also suited to sunny conditions while the others need rich moist soil.

For sunny conditions and deciduous plants, ageratum, alyssum, forget-me-not, lobelia, portulaca, perennial sweet pea and moss phlox. All are under six inches except alyssum and forget-me-not (under one foot) and sweet pea (over one foot).

Moss phlox and perennial sweet pea will continue to grow year after year. Moss pea may spread to large size if not controlled.

Cox makes these recommendations for the various plantings: forget-me-not and lobelia; covering bare spots — portulaca; for slopes — moss phlox; for good mud planting — myrtle and baltic ivy.

For good carpet under shade — Japanese pachyandra and carpet bugle.

If you're interested in shrubby ground covers, here are some ideas:

For year-around foliage under shady conditions common wind-creepers, euonymus and Halls Japanese hollyhock. Creeping juniper provides year around foliage under sunny conditions.

For deciduous foliage — Indian cornberryl under shade and fragrant sumac under sunny situations. All these shrubby covers are over one foot in height except the creeping juniper which is under six inches.

Spacing of these plants will depend on their mature size. As a general rule, they should be planted about as far apart each way as they grow in height.

Mat plantings for ground cover purposes require several years of growth to become thick and carpet like, Cox points out. He also says that some good ground cover plants should be put in "seedbeds" so to speak because of their creeping habit of growth. Bordering or surrounding them with walks, driveways or walls will help keep them under control.

Cox suggests that you consult a reputable local nurseryman in deciding which ground covers might be best suited for your needs.

**Free Booklet On Shrubs Available**

Shrubs, the beautifying ornamental plants we use in our home landscaping design, represent an investment that encourages thoughtful choice.

According to Don Juchartz, Wayne County Horticultural Agent, shrub buying is all too often an accidental, or haphazard, arrangement.

And, he points out, unless we know something about the plants we plan to use as an ornamental, we might achieve the wrong effect in home yard landscape design.

We have a booklet, he said, that is available without charge. And, this booklet covers many aspects of ornamental shrubs that are adapted to the four zones of Michigan.

The booklet describes shrubs and plants listed in alphabetical order and also groups those that fall in either of the following categories:

Shrubs that withstand a hard growing place; shrubs that do well in moist soils; shrubs that like dry soils; and shrubs that supply good autumn foliage color.

**MEMO TO ALL GARDENERS**

No matter whether you're a gardening fiend who spends every available moment out in the yard getting close to Old Mother Earth, or a garden-hater who would just as soon cover the yard with concrete and paint it green, you'll be doing yourself a real favor if you keep your garden tools in shape.

It's surprising, actually, when you realize that garden tools are practically universal. And yet they are probably also the most sadly neglected.

It's only common sense that garden tools with cutting edges—such as spades, shovels, lawn mowers and so on—will do a far better job if they are kept sharp. So when was the last time yours were sharpened?

And another thing: The smart gardener is one who keeps a full pull of oily sand (almost any kind of oil will do) in a clean, dry wooden bucket of each garden tool in this pull after each gardening session. By working the implement through the sand, you can clean off the dirt and add a protective coating of oil in one easy operation.

Next time the rain keeps you indoors, prepare for the good gardening weather by checking all the tools, tightening loose screws, sanding rough handles and gluing or taping cracked or splintered handles.

Even if you've been neglecting your garden tools for some time, it's never too late to turn yourself with some sandpaper, emery cloth, oil, glue and a few files—plus a firm resolution to make your garden tools do their maximum amount of work for you, which they will do if they're kept in tip-top condition.

**Plan Section 36 Water Controls**

Water restrictions will not be put into effect in Section 36, Farmington Township until such time as weather and water use require them, officials of the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Detroit, announced this week.

When regulations have to be applied they will pertain to use of water for lawns, gardens, shrubs and trees. The restrictions will cover the period from 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. Only. Old numbered hoses will be permitted to use. Water in old calendar dates and even numbered hoses on even calendar dates. No limitations will exist from 9 p.m. to 8 a.m. or on Sundays.

These rules will apply to vacant properties as such property lies on the odd or even sides of the street. Mechanical refrigeration systems used for cooling purposes for human comfort and using city water not re-circulated, shall be limited to average space temperature not less than 50 degrees F. dry bulb when the outside temperature is 90 degrees F. Provided this shall not apply to hospitals and other institutions, nor shall apply on Sundays.

The Detroit Board of Water Commissioners may require additional restrictions, or they may relax or waive any rule whenever in their judgment it may be done safely.

Official notification will be transmitted to Farmington Township officials and the press as soon as the effective date of the regulations has been determined.

**Avoid Poison Ivy, Sumac, Urge Health Dept.**

Learn to recognize Michigan's two most common poisonous plants—poison ivy and poison sumac—if you want to avoid them, the Michigan Department of Health urges.

Poison ivy can be found almost anywhere in the state along with poison sumac. It grows along roadsides, near golf courses, in parks, near beaches and in recreation areas. It flourishes in shady as well as sunny locations and in both moist and dry soils. Poison ivy also grows in a variety of forms, appearing as a vine, shrub or bush. Each poison ivy leaf is divided into three shiny green leaflets. An adult to identification is this old couplet: "Leaflets three, let them be."

Poison ivy sometimes is mistaken for Virginia creeper, which has five leaflets and is harmless. Virginia creeper can be identified by remembering that if the leaf has five leaflets just as you have five fingers, then it's all right to shake hands. The sumac leaf has between seven and 13 leaflets.

The non-poisonous staghorn sumac grows along roadsides, near golf courses, in parks, near beaches and in recreation areas. It resembles it in all ways except for a growing characteristic that makes identification easy. Poison sumac always grows in clumps while the staghorn variety grows only as single plants.

The active ingredient in poison ivy and poison sumac is believed to be a mixture of four catechol compounds. This poisonous mixture is present in all the plant parts except the fruit. Inflammation of the skin can result from touching the plants, by touching animals, tools or clothing that have contacted the plants, or by inhaling smoke arising from the burning of poison ivy or poison sumac plants.
