

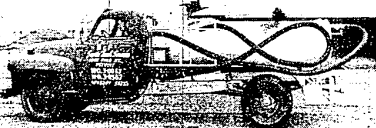
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**Loosen GI Home Buying Policy**

Sale of a veteran's GI-purchased home because of a new and better job in a different city may now give him a new GI loan eligibility, even though the job change was voluntary. Lloyd H. Jameson, manager of the Detroit regional office of the Veterans Administration, said:

"Better job" was defined by VA as being one that would increase the veteran's income or provide him with greater opportunity for advancement.

Restoration of GI loan eligibility formerly was made only if the job or transfer to another city was involuntary or beyond the veteran's control.

The new ruling, Jameson said, also applies to veterans moving to a different city following retirement.

However, no GI loan entitlement can be restored unless the VA is relieved of liability on the old loan. This generally is accomplished by payment of the loan in full, either by the veteran or the new purchaser.

Other circumstances under which a veteran may be entitled to a new GI loan eligibility are when the property:

1. Was taken by a governmental agency for public use;
2. Was destroyed by natural hazard; or
3. Was disposed of for compelling reasons of health or other specified reasons beyond control of the veteran.

**Drop DSR Bus Run On Beech**

A net loss of almost \$17,000 in the first eight weeks of operation has forced the DSR to suspend operation of the 8 Mile-West Beech Road bus line beginning June 20, it was announced Monday.

Leo J. Nowicki, DSR General Manager, stated that the bus line was put into operation on April 1, at the request of residents along Beech Road between Joy Road and Eight Mile.

He pointed out, however, that since that time very few riders have appeared to take advantage of this new service. Since April 1, the line has shown a steady loss of over \$2,000 for each week of operation, he commented.

With the discontinuation of this service, the Conant bus line will be extended west on 8 Mile Road to Lusher.

Service west of Lusher on 8 Mile is provided by the Five Points bus line. There will be no service on Beech Road.
