Seven To Receive Degrees At Wayne

Seven seniors at Wayne State University will be among a graduating class of 1,332 students to be awarded degrees at commencement exercises tonight, Thursday, June 13, in the State Fair Coliseum in Detroit.

Receiving Bachelor of Science degrees will be George Peter Bourquin of 21206 Grand River Cut-Off, Robert F. Gray of 32123 Notting-ham Knolls, Ann (Louys) Holmes of 23225 Warner, and Joseph W. Kurlejo of 31250 Bella Vista Drive. Master of Science degrees will be presented to John E. Atkinson of 31221 Lamar Drive and Vincent Simons, Jr., of 21811 Broadway Drive. Jerry H. Spink of 21849 Colgate will be awarded a Master of Education degree.


Dr. Clarence B. Hilberry, president of the University, will confer the degrees. A total of 24 candidates will receive doctorates, 19 in education and 11 in the Doctor of Philosophy degree. In addition to the 24 doctorates, the Graduate School will award 270 other degrees.

A total of 381 will receive degrees from the College of Education while the College of Liberal Arts will graduate 203. Other totals are: College of Medicine, 65; Law School, 61; College of Pharmacy, 45; College of Nursing, 10; School of Business Administration, 108; College of Engineering, 66; School of Social Work, 29.

Four honorary degrees will be conferred by Dr. Hilberry. The "Declaration of Civic Loyalty" will be read by Arthur Neef, vice-president and provost.

Music will be provided by the University Band directed by Mark F. Delomard, associate professor of music.
