### Township Board New Appliance Store Holds Grand Opening

(Continued from Page 1A) plat for the Ridgeway Subdivision north of Ten Mile and west of Floral pending a meeting with the City. Cote stated in a letter to the Board that the program is in accordance with the laws of the Federal Communications Commission and would only be used for emergencies and training. The Township agreed to enter into a contract with City for police radio service at a cost of \$4,400 for the year July 1, 1957, to July 1, 1958. This would cover both police and fire calls.

The Board approved the recommendation of Stephenson, that Officer Earl Teeple be appointed as Assistant Health Officer to work with Dr. S. A. Broadman on sanitation problems. The Supervisor stated that Teeple has conducted a partial survey of conditions in the Township and has ordered several persons to eliminate unsanitary conditions. They approved the recommendations of Stephenson and Irving Yates, Police Chief, on the hiring of William E. Frederick as Township Police Officer. Frederick declined Edward Ryder, who declined a recent appointment by the Board to continue his present employment. The new hire will take over his duties on June 15.

Richard Hull, chairman of the Fire Committee, submitted two recommendations to the Board requesting an inventory of all fire equipment as well as suggesting the appointment of an honorarium fire commission to coordinate activities of the three fire departments. The report was accepted and will be considered at a later meeting.

Stephenson advised the Board that an additional \$16,000 has been allocated by the County for road repair and maintenance in the Township. This brings the total amount of money available to approximately \$62,500. The Supervisor suggested that a goodly portion of these funds be used for ditching purposes. Mrs. Elise Avery repeated her previous request that consideration be given to a foot bridge near the Gill Road School.

### Grass Cutting Height Important

Whether you are making a new lawn, or taking care of an established lawn, cutting height is important for each grass variety.

This is especially true for shaded lawns where moving grasses from one place to another according to Don Juchartz, Wayne Horticultural Agent.

You will get a better turf where the grass is growing in competition with shade trees if you mow your lawns as recommended until about June 15, then put your lawnmower away. Bring it out only if the summer comes, according to Juchartz, that the grass becomes unsightly.

Such shaded lawns are in heavy competition with trees and shrubs for food and water. Open lawns have their problems as well for they are exposed to the hot summer sun and suffer the danger of drought.
