PREPARE PLANS FOR ROPOSED POWERS ROAD BRIDGE

Earl Scherffius, City Manager, reported this week that work is now underway on the preparation of plans and specifications for a new bridge to be constructed on Powers Road just north of Grand River.

The City Manager stated that the new bridge will probably consist of twin tubes and will be of a width to take care of the proposed widening and resurfacing of the bridge. Scherffius added that the bridge construction must be completed before the resurfacing project can be started.

It is expected that a contract for the bridge construction will be awarded by the Council early in July.

Under the present section, the minimum lot area in Residential Three Zones is 9,000 square feet and in Residential Four is 15,000 feet.

(Continued from Page 1A) the Oakland County Board of Education for consideration.

In other action, the Board approved the expenditure of \$3,856.75 for additional shop furniture and equipment at the Duncel Junior High and authorized the purchase of four more feet of chalk board for each of the rooms in the new Kendallwood and William Grace elementary schools. It was pointed out by the administration that the four more feet of chalk board had been specified for the two new schools than is used in the present buildings. Also approved was the borrowing of \$10,000 from the Farmington branch of the National Bank of Detroit on tax anticipation notes following the opening of the organization's bid. This was the only bid received.

A progress report given by Earl Meyers, architect, indicated that work which had previously been slow down on both the William Grace and Kendallwood elementary schools because of wet weather was progressing satisfactorily again. The roof will be on and possibly the entire building completed at the William Grace site before the end of the month, he said. No future holdups on either of the two jobs are anticipated, he commented.

A major portion of the meeting was devoted to the study of building plans for various school units under the drawing boards as submitted by architects. Nearly completed drawings for both the Middlebelt and Gill Road school additions were reviewed. The architects were instructed to proceed with finished drawings. A rough sketch and plot plan for a proposed new elementary school between Kendallwood and Westbrook Manor Subdivisions was also reviewed.

Following the adjournment of the regular Board meeting, a special committee meeting was held. It was moved by Trustee Douglas Hamill and seconded by Trustee Vernon Fisher that present officers be elected to serve in their same positions for another year.

JOINT LIBRARY GROUP AGREES ON POLICY DRAFT

At a session of the joint City-Township Library Committee held last Thursday evening at the Municipal Building, agreement was reached on a preliminary "declaration of policy" for the continuing operation of the District Library program.

A copy of the proposed declaration, as prepared by Paul Paré, City Attorney of A. G. Leonard, Township Attorney, was presented to the committee for study and consideration. Following the presentation of several suggested changes, the Committee authorized the preparation of a final draft of the declaration.

(Continued from Page 1A) which completed an audit of the Township records in March of this year.

Action was also taken by the Board employing Walter Lange as Assistant Township Assessor at a salary of \$5,750, plus a \$500 car allowance. Lange will assume his new duties on June 15. Stephenson stated that Lange has been employed by Southfield Township since 1952, and is highly recommended by both Southfield officials and Oakland County. Lange will work with William Gallagher, Township Assessor, on the appraisal property. Gallagher advised the Board, prior to its action, that under the present set-up, it would require approximately five years to complete the appraisal program. With the aid of an additional assessor, Gallagher estimated that the job would be done in two and one half to three years.

The Supervisor was authorized by the Board to employ a dog warden for a period of three months in consultation with the County Health Officer.

Traffic Deaths In May Reduced

Traffic deaths in Michigan in May were 19 less than in the same month a year ago, marking the fifth consecutive month in which there has been a reduction, according to State Police provisional figures.

Getting off to a poor start during which deaths were higher, May slowly began to inch ahead on the safety side and ended with a total of 123 killed as compared with 133 in the same month last year, a saving of eight per cent.

Final figures for April also were released, showing 111 persons killed and 4,389 injured in 13,433 accidents. Deaths decreased 21 per cent, or 29 under 140 in the same month of 1956; injuries increased four per cent over 4,224 and accidents were reduced one per cent under 14,021.

For the first five months this year 564 persons have been killed compared with 707 for the same period in 1956, a reduction of 143 or 20 per cent. This is at the rate of about the goal of a total per cent saving for 1957, or 174 less lives than the 1,747 killed last year.

All figures in detail and give consideration to each of the comparisons made. It was indicated that some discrepancies in the report had already been noted. Specifically, it was pointed out that it will be possible to accommodate at least 300 more students at the new Duncel Junior High than was estimated in the report. This will greatly reduce the per pupil cost of erecting the building.

Board members also emphasized the fact that they have in the past followed a policy of setting a limit on the amount of money to be spent for constructing a new school unit. That schools can be built for nearly any price and that some districts are building schools considerably cheaper than Farmington while others are spending a great deal more is common knowledge, the Board pointed out.

It is the desire of the Board to build new schools with as many improved and desirable features as possible but yet within the cost range that the district is able to afford, individual Board members commented following the Monday night meeting.

Another report made Thursday night by the Site Sub-Committee of the Advisory group disclosed that negotiations had been completed by committee and School Board members for a six acre site in Section 11 at the end of Alceyke. It was also stated that negotiations were progressing favorably for another elementary school site as well as a possible new junior high site in Section 13.

A suggestion was made at the advisory group meeting by Herbert Neal that consideration be given to making more use of pre-existing buildings on the campus of having two full school sessions daily on a shift basis or of extending the school year and conducting classes in a three semester program were cited as methods of reducing school overcrowding.
