Clarenceville Graduates Record Number At Exercise Thursday

Seventy-nine seniors at Clarenceville High received their diplomas from Fred Bailey, President of the Clarenceville Board of Education Thursday, June 13.

Speaker at the commencement was Mr. Donald S. Leonard, Commissioner of the Michigan State Police. Mr. Leonard chose as his topic "Responsibilities of Citizenship". He emphasized the importance of good citizenship in all phases of life and encouraged the graduates and their friends to become active in public and community work.

"The only way we can have good law enforcement," Mr. Leonard said, "is to have good citizens active in community and public affairs."

Mr. Max A. Millard, principal, presented the Class of 1957. In addressing the graduates, Mr. Millard noted that the class had achieved many "firsts" in the history of the school. It was the largest graduating class, it had the highest number of students who will further their education and it was the first class to have a foreign exchange student.

The foreign exchange student mentioned was Elda Dossena from Milan, Italy. Elda received her diploma from her father here in the United States, Mr. Bailey. Other students receiving diplomas from parents were: Kay Mann, who received her diploma from Arthur Mann her father and a member of the Clarenceville faculty; and Catherine Barnes, who received her diploma from Mrs. Wanda Barnes, her mother and a member of the Clarenceville system.
