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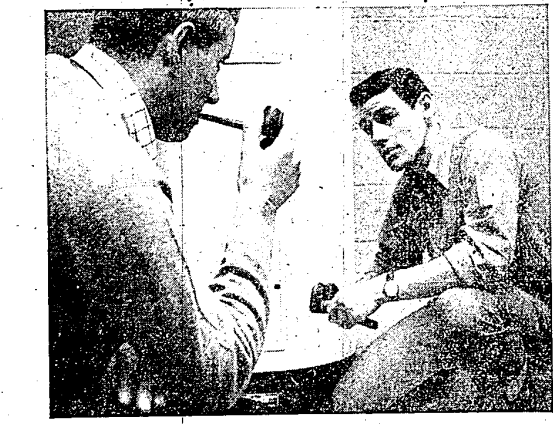

Fluoride Treating Program Started

Michigan's 10th annual statewide summer topical fluoride program for children was opened June 17 at 173 centers in 44 counties, the state health department announced.

Oakland was one of the counties in which a center is being maintained.

About 150,000 Michigan youngsters between the ages of 3 and 13 years inclusive have had fluoride painted on their teeth since the first summer program was conducted in 1948. The summer programs supplement year-round topical application programs offered by many Michigan communities.

This summer's program will provide topical applications for about 32,500 children. Each child will be given applications during four sittings covering from one week up to one month.

Fifty-nine University of Michigan and University of Detroit students will give the applications. The group includes 19 dental students who have completed their junior year of training and 40 first- or second-year dental hygienists.

The Michigan Department of Health has general charge of conducting the state-wide program and orienting the staff. Local dentists will supervise and consult at each application center in cooperation with local health departments.

A small fee is charged for the series of applications so that the program supports itself financially.

Topical application of fluoride reduces tooth decay by 40 per cent in children and is a painless experience, the Michigan Department of Health points out. Children should receive applications at four different ages—the first time at the age of 3, 4 or 5 and then again when the child is in the second, fifth and eighth grades.
