It was designed by the well-known architect, Marcus Burrows, and built in 1820 for the Kirby White family who occupied it for many years. Later occupants were Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Nash; the latter being a past-president of the Farmington Garden Club.

The grounds feature grade landscaping, rose garden, patio and adjacent church.

Spring Hats
Take 7 Shapes,
Says Authority

It's not a case of "what's to be" when it comes to buying Milady's spring bonnet. There are some rather definite shapes and fabrics in the hat fashion news, and they can be pinned down into seven basic silhouettes.

Spring hats, in general, are small to moderate size with deep or high crowns, and plain Margaret Werner, instructor in textiles, clothing and related arts at Michigan State University. According to her the seven basics are these:

1. The softly rounded crown with a symmetrical brim rolled up all around.

2. The high crown hat also explains itself and is being shown in crushed shapes using straws and fabrics.

3. The casual cloche is a close fitting helmet shaped hat with a deep crown, with or without a brim. This spring, side detail such as flowers, ribbons and beads, as shown, low on the crown accepting the brim.

4. The upturned profile hat frames the facial contour with an upward brim.

Schools Set Up
Disaster Program

Individual programs for safety measures to be taken in each of the schools in the Farmington Public School system in the event of a tornado or other disaster threat have now been set up.

Each of the schools in the system were visited and studied by a committee composed of Roger Cole, director of Civil Defense in Farmington, representatives from the school administration and the school board, the head school custodian and the community's police and fire departments. After inspecting each of the schools with the respective principals, a program of safety steps was outlined. The safest as well as most dangerous spots in each building were noted and a system worked out of moving and locating students within the building to assure a minimum of casualties in the event of a disaster.

It was indicated that a program is being set up to provide for regular drills in each of the buildings for disaster preparedness similar to fire drills which have been conducted for some time.
