State Police Plan  
Heavy Patrol Over  
July 4 Week-End

Michigan State Police predict that the state traffic death toll over the coming Fourth of July holiday period will approach 35 and possibly climb even higher unless drivers observe every precaution of safety.

Meanwhile, the department is gearing itself for an intense patrol effort to hold down accidents as much as possible, and will have about a thousand officers on duty.

Past days of all enlisted personnel have been cancelled beginning Wednesday noon, July 3, until midnight Sunday, July 7. Detectives will help to take over post deck jobs, relieving uniform personnel for national guardsmen will be used for point control and assignment as the second man in two-man patrols, which will permit the regular second uniform man to take out another patrol. They will work 10-hour shifts on patrol.

Sheriff's departments will use 116 National Guardsmen.

The prediction of 35 deaths is based upon past records. In 1956, there were 12 persons killed in the 30 hour period from 6 p.m. Tuesday, July 3, to midnight Wednesday, July 4. This year, with the fourth coming on Thursday, many will be cautioning the entire week end. Last year 23 persons were killed on the Friday, Saturday and Sunday following the fourth.

During the last seven years deaths over the Fourth of July period have averaged one each two and three hours.

"Drivers must remember that in the heavy holiday period traffic will be unusually alert and drive strictly according to highway, traffic and weather conditions," said State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs. "They must obey all traffic regulations and be on guard against the mistakes of others. And don't speed. It's better to take a little longer to live much longer."

According to the Associated Press, the gas utilities and pipe line companies have so far spent \$500 million on holes in the ground. These holes amount to warehouses, in which gas is stored in the warm season for delivery when winter sends demand soaring.

Disabled Must File  
Social Security  
Claim By June 30

June 30 is an important date for disabled people, remarked Mr. William E. LaRock, District Manager of the Social Security Administration. Mr. LaRock stated that the June 30 date this year has particular significance for an estimated 700,000 disabled workers in this country. These are disabled people who have worked long enough under social security to be eligible for their rights to future benefits for themselves and their families protected—those between 50 and 65 years of age—are eligible for monthly disability insurance benefits beginning in July. Many of those eligible have not yet applied.

"The aim of the over 500 district offices of the Social Security Administration at this time is to get in touch with these disabled people prior to the deadline date of June 30, 1957, and assist them in filing applications," LaRock stated.

Anyone who is now disabled for work and has not worked since September 1954, will lose his disability rights under the Social Security Law if he does not apply by June 30. If a disabled worker does not make his application until July 1957, or later, his future benefits may be substantially reduced or lost and he may not be eligible for the monthly disability insurance benefits payable to disabled workers 50 to 65 years of age.

Disabled workers who believe they are eligible should get in touch with their social security district offices now to protect their rights.

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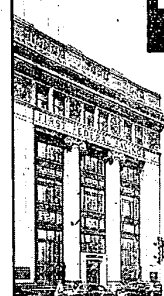
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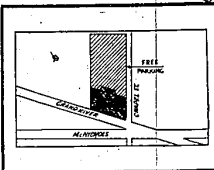
