Cubs Move Into Second Place With Win Over Tigers Monday

On Monday, June 24, the Cubs won their third game in a row, the second straight over the Tigers, in a hard fought pitching duel between Bob Ratke of the Cubs and George Becker of the Tigers.

The Cubs jumped on pitcher George Becker for three runs in the top half of the first inning on a walk by Larry Clayton, singles by Terry McDowell and an error on a hit by Cameron Ault which scored Larry Clayton. A single by Dennis Heinonen scored Terry McDowell and Cameron Ault scored on George Griffin's ground-out to short stop, giving the Cubs a 3-0 lead at the end of the first inning.

The Tigers came right back in the second inning to score one run on singles by Tom Cauffman and Bradley Parker to cut the Cubs' lead to two runs.

The Tigers cut the Cubs' lead to one run in the top of the third on singles by Ben Clayton and Jeff Barth which scored Ben Clayton from second. The play of the game was John Walton's catch of a line drive by George Becker, throwing to second base, doubling Jeff Barth to end the third inning.

From this point until the bottom of the fifth, it was a real pitchers' duel.

The Cubs padded their one-run lead when Larry Clayton was safe on first on an error by the first baseman, Terry McDowell walked and Cameron Ault singled to load the bases. Dennis Heinonen singled, scoring Larry Clayton.

George Griffin then beat out an infield single, scoring Terry McDowell. With the bases loaded and one out, George Becker struck out the remaining two batters. The Cubs had scored two runs on three hits and went into the top of the sixth inning with a three-run lead.

The score was 5-2 by the Tigers' heavy hitters were coming to bat. Junior Callahan led off with a single and Jeff Barth hit his sixth home run of the season over the left field fence to cut the Cubs' lead to one run.

The next batter to face Bob Ratke was George Becker, who had already been robbed of two hits. Becker drove a hard-hit line drive to right field, which Terry McDowell went to the fence and pulled down to rob Becker for the third time of the ball game. Ratke then retired the remaining two batters to face him with ease, to win his second game of the season, against one loss.

Ratke had strong support behind him with outfielders Dennis Heinonen, John Walker and Terry McDowell all making spectacular catches on drives hit by George Becker in the first, third and sixth innings. Little Miles Kearney made an amazing catch of a ball hit by Craig Nelson in the fourth inning.

Yankees, Cubs Win Saturday

Saturday, June 22, in the first game of a double-header, the Yankees surprised the League-leading Cardinals, knocking them off for the second time in two weeks.

Both losses came at the hand of pitcher Allen Clark, although he allowed only seven hits in the six innings that he pitched. Three of the hits came in the first inning, with singles by Danny Eliola, Tom Thomas and Bob Byrne, which scored two runs. The only other inning in which the Cardinals also gave the Yankees any trouble was the fourth inning with Mike Glider singling and Danny Eliola hitting his second home run of the season.

The Yankees mustered their seven runs in the third and fourth innings on six hits. They scored four of their runs in the third on three walks, an error and two base hits by Joe Jentzer and Tom Bradley. They scored their final three runs in the fourth inning on hits by Joe McClure, Joe Jentzer, a double by Allen Clark and a single by Tom Sherlock which drove the Cardinals' starting pitcher, Don Dits, from the mound.

This was Davis' first start. Mike Weber relieved Davis and pitched the remaining two innings without any trouble. The seven runs that the Yankees netted in the third and fourth innings were all they needed to win their second win of the season.

This gives Carl Johnson's Yankees the nickname, "The Giant Killers."

In the second game of the twin bill, the Cubs continued their winning streak by defeating the Tigers, 11 to 8.

The Cubs scored runs in every inning except the sixth, blasting Bradley Parker for 11 hits. Two of these were home runs by Cameron Ault, one of which came in the first inning, his second of the season, which netted two runs and the other home run, his second of the game and third of the season, came in the fourth inning with the bases loaded. Ault drove in the six of the 11 runs the Cubs netted.

Other hitters for the Cubs were John Walton with three hits in four times at bat, Larry Clayton with two hits in two times at bat. The Tigers peeked at starting pitcher Jim Stevenson for six innings, netting four runs on six hits: one of them was Jeff Barth's home run of the season. George Griffin relieved Stevenson in the fourth inning and pitched the remaining three, allowing five runs on six hits.

Three of the runs came in the top half of the sixth inning, when the Tigers staged a strong rally on four hits and a walk and with one out and runners on second and third. Griffin retired the final two batters to preserve Jim Stevenson's first win of the season.

Jeff Barth was again heavy hitter for the Tigers with a perfect day, a home run, a double and two singles, which drove in three of the Tigers' eight runs. Other hitters for the Tigers were Tom Cauffman, who also had a perfect day with two hits in two times at bat, and Craig Nelson, who had two hits in three times at bat.

Losing pitcher was Bradley Parker, his first loss of the season.

Farmington Savings To Hold Month-Long Grand Opening

A month-long grand opening celebration will be held at the new Farmington Savings and Loan Association building at 31500 Ten Mile Road just west of Orchard Lake Road, beginning Monday, July 1.

Several free gifts and prizes will be given away during the grand opening. Persons opening a new account or adding to their savings during this time will receive gifts of a barbecue set or a picnic set, depending upon the size of the account opened. Cash prizes totaling \$250 in savings accounts will also be given away.

Completely modern, the new building offers many special features. A drive-in window makes it possible to conduct banking transactions without leaving the car, and an ample parking lot of 75 cars for as many as 45 inside the building, a special junior savings department is available. A safety stairway at one window brings the savings counter down to half-size and permits youngsters to make their own deposits and withdrawals.

In the basement of the new structure, which is 60 foot by 60 feet in size, a unit known as the "Farmington Friendship Room" has been set up and is being made available free to all community organizations wishing to use it. The room will seat as many as 150 people with kitchen and rest room facilities available.

Farmington Savings services include: regular savings accounts, investment savings accounts, travelers' cheque service, money orders, safety deposit boxes, night depository service and a save-by-mail service. Mortgages for residents of the area may also be arranged for through the Savings and Loan Association.

Opened in a temporary building on Orchard Lake Road near Grand River, Farmington Savings and Loan has experienced a tremendous growth during a short period. During the past fiscal year, the organization has tripled its assets, raising them from \$300,000 by the end of the current fiscal year.

Officers of Farmington Savings and Loan are: Frank E. Holtzman, president; T. Vance Kefauver, secretary, and A. J. Primm and Judge Allen C. Ingie, members of the board of directors.
