### Text Of Resignation Letter Filed By Members Of Joint Library Board

The following is a copy of a letter of resignation signed by three of the four members of the Joint City-Township Library Board. One copy of the letter, signed by C. Goddard Smith, 22500 Manning, and Howard Thayer, 33014 Grand River, city representatives on the Library Board, was submitted to the City Council on Friday. An identical copy, signed by Edward Moseman, 22500 Manning, township representative on the Board on the same day, Mrs. Ethel Gibson, the second Township representative, is presently visiting outside this state and did not participate in the signing.

June 27, 1957

Gentlemen:

On August 31, 1955, and on October 11, 1955, the City Council of Farmington and the Board of Trustees of Farmington Township, respectively, passed resolutions to call under Act 164 of Public Acts of 1955 of the State of Michigan to develop cooperatively a plan and budget for the establishment of a District Library. At a later date, the Township Board of Trustees appointed Mr. Edward Moseman and Mr. Howard Thayer, city representatives, and Mr. Edward Moseman and Mr. Howard Thayer, township representatives, to the Library Board under said Act. Mrs. Lachmann later resigned, and the Board appointed Mrs. Ethel Gibson in her place. On March 19, 1956, the Farmington City Council appointed the undersigned to be members of said Board.

On or about June 2, 1956, Mr. Paul Pare, Attorney for the City of Farmington, called Mr. Edward Moseman on the telephone and asked him if he would not feel that he could advise the City of Farmington to attempt to fall under Act 164 of Public Acts of 1955 because the Will of Clinton W. Wilber, Decedent, had been admitted to probate in the City of Farmington.

On July 16, 1956, the Council of the City of Farmington passed a resolution that Paul Pare, Attorney for the City of Farmington, be authorized to prepare and file necessary proceedings to obtain a judicial construction of the provisions of the Will of Clinton W. Wilber (15) of the Wilber Will including the rights and powers of the City of Farmington to convert the assets of said Estate now in the possession and control of the City to a joint City and Township of Farmington District Library Board, created under provisions of Act 164 of Public Acts of 1955.

Approximately six months later, on the 11th day of February, 1957, the Circuit Court for the County of Oakland in Chancery, rendered a Decree, among the provisions of which and the other provisions pertinent to this letter, are as follows:

"And the Court finding that the devise and bequest contained in the last Will and Testament of Clinton W. Wilber \*\*\* will be fully met and satisfied by the use thereof by the Board of Trustees of the Farmington City and Township District Library, and that therefore the prayers of the bill of complaint should be granted.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED:

1. That plaintiff, City of Farmington, a Municipal Corporation, be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to pay, turn over and deliver to the Board of Trustees of Farmington City and Township District Library the property, money and effects received by it from the Estate of Clinton W. Wilber, Decedent, Michigan, which disposition is hereby declared to be in full accord and agreement with the intent of the testator as expressed in said Will."

At later dates, the Township Board and the City Council passed resolutions authorizing and directing the former Library Board to turn over all of its books, records and other assets to the newly formed City and Township District Library Board, and gave authority to the District Library Board to assume its duties and to take over complete charge, control and management of the present City and Township Library. The City of Farmington, however, since the date of said Decree, namely, February 11, 1957, has failed to turn over the assets of the Estate of Clinton W. Wilber, Decedent.

A copy of a proposed agreement between the City of Farmington and the Township of Farmington having to do with the City and Township District Library under Act 164 of Public Acts of 1955 has been handed to the Board of Trustees of the City and Township District Library with the request that said Board approve said contract.

The Farmington City and Township District Library Board of Trustees can in no wise and in no manner approve this contract. Some of the reasons for this are as follows:

Paragraph 2 of the contract states that the assets of the Wilber Estate are in possession and control of the City of Farmington under the provision of the Last Will and Testament of Clinton W. Wilber, Decedent. The District Library Board takes the position that these assets are unlawfully and wrongfully held by the City of Farmington under the Decree of the Court, and that the City is under legal duty to turn these assets over to the District Library Board and that the City is in contempt of Court for failing to turn them over.

### Complete Army Radio Course

Pvt. Ronald L. Carr, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack E. Carr, 3164 Northwestern Highway Farmington, was graduated June 21 from the radio relay and carrier operation course at the Army's Southeastern Signal School, Fort Gordon, Georgia.

The eight-week course trained him to operate and maintain field radio relay, carrier and associated equipment.

Carr entered the Army last December and completed basic combat training at Fort Carson, Colorado.

The 192 Northwestern High School graduate was a self-proclaimed radio repairman in civilian life.

Since it is impossible to proceed under present conditions, we, the undersigned, resign from the Farmington City and Township District Library Board of Trustees, and request prompt acceptance of our resignations and prompt appointments of our successors.
