Police Prepare For Traffic Jam

Farmington City and Township Police, along with State Police and Sheriff's officers have completed detailed plans for the handling of an anticipated record flow of traffic in the Farmington area during the Fourth of July Holiday.

City Police Chief Joseph D. Vriend and Township Police Chief Irving Yakes stated that while regular duty schedules will be followed during the holiday period, all officers will be subject to immediate call in case of emergency. State Police are planning additional road patrols during the holiday period in an effort to keep traffic moving and reduce the anticipated heavy accident toll.

Efforts will be concentrated on Grand River, Orchard Lake Road, Middlebelt and the important east and west Mile Roads. Since the closing of the Cut-Off, Grand River has been listed as a critical traffic area by state safety officials. The area requiring heavy patrolling. Persons are urged to avoid traveling on Grand River during the holiday period, if at all possible.

Devriend stated that the traffic light at the intersection of Grand River and Farmington Road will be manually operated if necessary to eliminate congestion in the downtown area. Officials emphasized that while the fatality rate was unusually low on the last Thursday holiday, which was Memorial Day, the following weekend was extremely costly in deaths and injuries.

Chemical Treatment Of Lakes Success

Conservation Department fish biologists indicated that the treatment of the four lakes was "pleased and encouraged" by preliminary results of chemical treatment last year of four Michigan lakes.

The lakes, which were treated to reduce excess panfish populations, are Island Lake, Livingston county; Saddle Lake, Van Buren county; Turk Lake, Montcalm county; and Lower Scott Lake, Allegan county.

Fish division workers recently sampled the four lakes to investigate the effect of chemical treatment.

The Handyman's NOTEBOOK

THOSE NOT-SO-SIMPLE JOBS

Ever notice that the jobs that look the easiest often turn out to be harder to do properly than the jobs that really look hard?

Well, I've got a theory about that. I think that what happens is that some things look SO easy that we assume there is nothing we have to learn before we try them. And on the other hand, most of us never tackle a tough-looking job without first taking the trouble to learn all we can about how it should be done.

For instance, laying concrete looks tough, so what does a man do when he is faced with his first concrete-laying job? Why he takes the trouble to find out how it's done.

On the other hand, painting, for instance, looks so easy that many people are convinced from the start that all they have to do is open the paint can, dip in a brush and start slapping it on.

Now painting, though sometimes tiring and monotonous, is not particularly tricky—unless you start with the attitude that it's so simple it doesn't even require any know-how. Then, Brother, you're in for trouble—or a poor paint job—or both.

Some people, for instance, don't even observe the most elementary rules, such as making sure the surface they're painting is clean and dry. Many neglect to clean the paint brush or roller after each painting session. (Clean with turpentine if it's oil base paint; water and detergent if it's rubber base paint.)

There are tricks to every trade, and none of us should ever be proud to admit there is anything we might learn to make it easier. Whenever you drop in to talk over your projects with us, don't be afraid to ask questions, no matter how elementary they may seem to you. It's often the simple things that are the most important.

And while I'm on the subject, let me say that we've never had a finer selection of paints than right now.

determine the cost of the project to the last cent, however it is estimated that it will run approximately \$2.00 per lineal foot frontage. According to the new state law such projects can be financed up to a 30 year period. However the final decision will have to come from the bonding attorney.

The source of water for the Township system will come from the City of Detroit and will be available by the time financing and construction work is completed within the "dry area."
