National Meet

Members of Business & Professional Women's Clubs of Michigan including the local club will attend the privileges provided by a Board Meeting of the National Federation of Business & Professional Women's Clubs convening July 6 at the Hotel Statler.

This is the first time for many years that a National Board Meeting has been held in this state and the first time that many Michigan members have had an opportunity to meet their national officers and committee chairmen as well as the Presidents of the 48 State Federations, Alaska, District of Columbia and Hawaii.

The Farmington Business & Professional Women's Club will be hosts to the State President of Massachusetts, Mrs. Avis C. Bourne, of Sterling, Massachusetts. A welcoming committee will meet her at the airport and escort her to the Hotel Statler. At the hotel, there will be flowers and candy in her room, and she will be presented with a gift from the Farmington Club.

Many activities have been planned for the interest and pleasure of visiting B.P.W.s. A banquet will be held on Saturday with the Inter-Club Council of Detroit as hostesses. Viola M. Wolfe, Michigan State President, will welcome the guests. Virginia R. Altan, immediate past president of the Michigan Federation will introduce Miss Hazel Palmer, from Sedalia, Missouri, National President, at the speaker. Her topic will be "Action Can Achieve Full Citizenship."

There will be an American-Canadian Luncheon on Sunday at noon, followed by a special demonstration at 2 o'clock staged by the Michigan Office of Civil Defense. Sunday evening, Governor G. Mennen Williams will deliver the keynote address. Following the program the Michigan Federation will be hosts at a reception honoring Governor and Mrs. Williams and all out of state visitors.

"I believe there will be representatives from most of the 106 clubs in our Michigan Federation in attendance," stated Viola Wolfe, president. "It's a rare opportunity for our members to share in the inspiration provided for us by the National Board Meeting being held in Detroit." National B.P.W. headquarters are in Washington, D. C. The Federation has 171,000 members.

Funeral Services Held For Sister
Mary Paula, First Head At Madonna

Funeral services were held Monday, June 24, at the Pelican Sisters convent in Livonia for Sister Mary Paula, CSSP, former President-Dean of Madonna College and most recently principal of St. Andrew high school, Detroit. Burial was at Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

The death occurred Thursday evening, June 21. Sister Paula was 63 years of age. Sister spent 45 years in religious life in various educational positions.

Sister Paula's wholehearted devotion was especially manifested in the formative years of Madonna College, senior college for women, in Livonia. She was its first President-Dean from 1917 to 1953. During her term the academic and administrative organization of the institution took shape. In 1951 a 100-bed dormitory wing for resident students was constructed on the grounds. In 1952 the College opened a remedial reading clinic for children and adults.

With the initiation of plans for St. Mary's Hospital to be built on the convent grounds, Sister Paula dedicated her efforts to furthering the building fund campaign and gaining the goodwill of surrounding communities.

For a period of seven years (1946-1953) Sister Paula was also a member of the provincial council, the administrative body governing the Pelican Sisters of the Detroit-Livonia Province, which staffs educational and charitable institutions in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana.

Surviving Sister Paula is her sister, Mrs. Anna Burbano of Detroit.

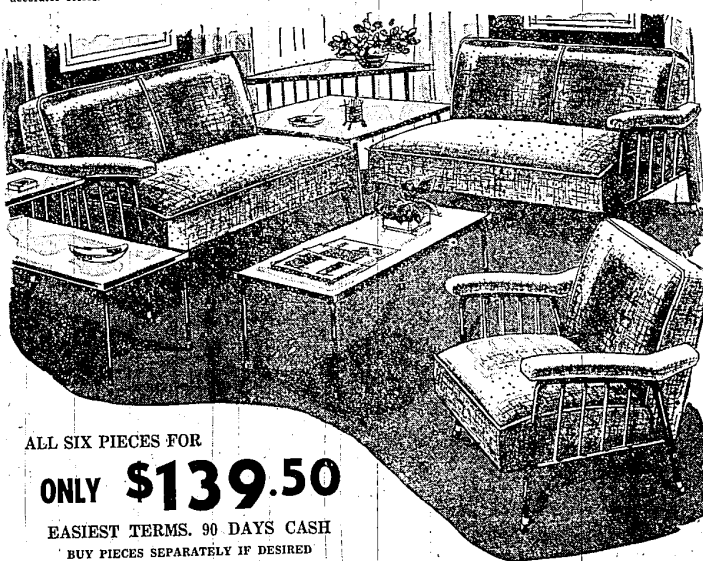
