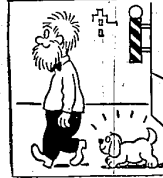
**Knights-Columbus

**Teacher Training Crisis Increasing
At Elementary Level, Report Reveals**

One out of three elementary school children in Michigan will be under the guidance of inadequately prepared teachers by 1964, says a report.

This is the picture as presented by a subcommittee on teacher education of the Michigan Council of State College Presidents in a recent report entitled "Teacher Demand and Supply in Michigan—1954-1970."

Dean Charles Odegaard of The University of Michigan College of Literature, Science and the Arts, served as chairman of the subcommittee, while Dean Willard Olson of the School of Education was a member.

"There is a real and present danger that the standards of the teacher group in Michigan will, fairly rapidly, deteriorate to 'less than college level,'" the report warns.

It is predicted that substandard certificate holders, "now concentrated in the lower grades," will appear more frequently in the upper grades and in the high schools.

"Michigan faces now the signs of deterioration in the standard it is able to demand in recruiting a sufficient number of qualified teachers to man its public schools. This deterioration threatens both the elementary and secondary schools as they search for qualified teachers," the report says.

For the next several years, there will be some 70,000 more children in school each year than there were the previous year, adding one-third of a million children to the school population over a five-year period; the report indicates.

"The combination of inadequate qualified teachers and large classes has already, in many cases, resulted in education of poorer quality than that necessary for intelligent adulthood," it concludes.

Boys Republic Group Taking Two-Week Outing

A group of 15 boys from Boys Republic on Nine Mile Road just west of Inkster in Farmington, left Monday, July 8, for a two-week outing of camping, fishing and exploring in Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

Dr. Milton Huber, who heads the residential treatment center for disturbed boys, says the outing — first of its kind in the Republic's 50-year history — is "something of an experiment."

They have taken some of the boys on weekend trips and camps, "outs," he said, "but we've never tried taking them so far away for so long a period."

"We believe an outing of this kind can help importantly in our efforts to rehabilitate these boys. It will help us gain greater insight into them and their attitudes and each other. Camping is an intimate group experience which will help show us how willing and ready the boys are to work and play together and to accept the individual responsibilities necessary to the success of such a venture."

Accompanied by Dr. Huber and several other staff members, the boys spent their first night at Wilderness State Park near Mackinaw City and traveled on Tuesday to Tahquamenon Falls in the Upper Peninsula.

Other stops on their itinerary will include the Grand Marais sand dunes and Hawaitha National Forest on July 11; Presque Isle and Big Bay camp on Lake Independence north of Marquette, July 12; the Huron Mountains and Baraga State Park, July 13; L'Anse Falls and Fort Wilkins State Park at the northern tip of the Keweenaw Peninsula, July 14; the copper mines at Ripley and Porcupine Mountain State Park, July 16; Black Creek Falls and Presque Creek Falls, July 17; Agate Falls and Crystal Falls, July 18; Indian Lake and Straits State Park, July 19, and Lake Louise July 20, enroute home.

**Goodwill Wins
Rehabilitation
Project Award**

Detroit Goodwill Industries was given the top award among 120 Goodwill Industries for its new program development at Maybury Sanatorium. The award was presented to Harold H. McKinnon, executive director, at the final session of the National Conference of Goodwill Industries of America in Denver, Colorado.

The Maybury project is a new plan in the rehabilitation of physically handicapped persons and is co-sponsored by the City of Detroit, Wayne County, the State Office of Vocational Rehabilitation and the TB and Health Society.

The award heralds the Maybury rehabilitation of the handicapped. The plan was outlined at the conference for study by other Goodwill Industries and may open up new fields in cities where such an expansion program is feasible.

The new program at Maybury is designed to prepare TB patients and paraplegic patients in Wayne County General Hospital to return to useful places in the community.

They now gain more than the medical assistance that they had and are able to return to self-supporting jobs four to eight months sooner than previously.

Materials for the program are taken from the main Goodwill plant at 6322 Brush.

Anyone interested in aiding the Maybury plan can contribute usable discarded by calling TRIN 3-6900. A Goodwill truck will pick the articles up and send them to Maybury Sanatorium where they will be reconditioned under the direction of Harry Edsall, Goodwill's supervisor. Medical and work tolerance factors are watched carefully by Dr. W. L. Howard, medical superintendent at the sanatorium and his staff.

**Veterans Urged
To Notify V.A.
When Moving**

Veterans or their dependents who receive Veterans Administration benefit checks should notify VA promptly if they move, Lloyd H. Jameson, manager of the VA regional office in Detroit, said today.

Under law, VA payment checks for benefits cannot be forwarded to a different address. They must be returned to the U. S. Treasury. Mr. Jameson said that in notifying the VA regional office of a change of address, a person should identify himself with the "C-number" assigned in connection with the claim.

Change of address requests must be made in writing to VA, Mr. Jameson emphasized, pointing out that this requirement is for the protection of the person entitled to receive the check.
