

## New Detroit Bank-Trust Company Office To Open In Farmington July 15

Understandings to be achieved is given, and specific materials for the development of supporting skills are suggested—charts, books, tape recordings, visitations, etc.

The suggested Course Content includes: (1) Our Citizenship Heritage; (2) The Foundations of Our Government; (3) The Structure of Our National Government; (4) Our National Government in World Affairs; (5) The Organization of State and Local Government; (6) Our Rights and Duties as Good Citizens; (7) Propaganda techniques; (8) Preparation for Telling the Story of the American System of Government to Others.

**Books for Study**

Basic textbook for this Harding Academy Civics course is Today's Problems, by R. O. Hughes, Allyn and Bacon, Dallas, publishers. 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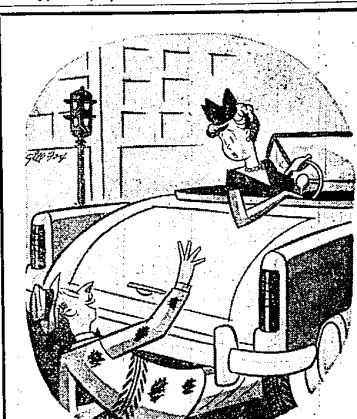

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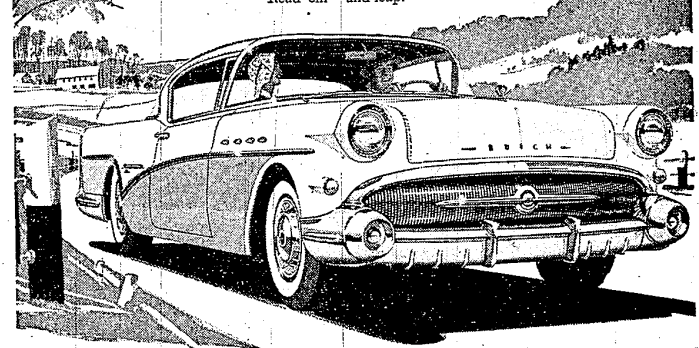
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
